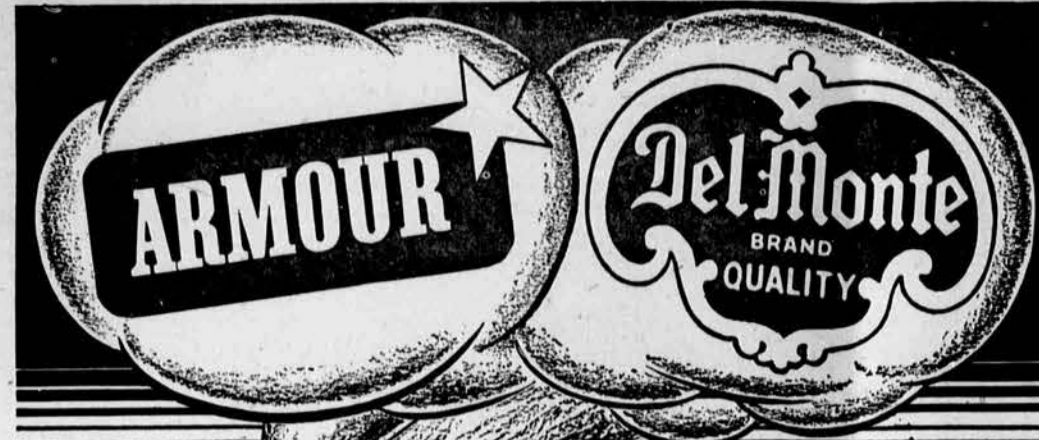

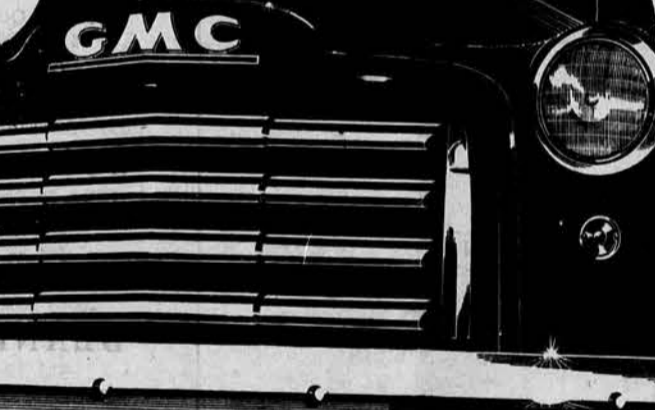

Wildlife's new look Fish, Game Prosperity Ahead!

It seems that Hamilton Ralls, the new Director of the Game & Fish Commission, has come up with plans to relieve some of the terrific hunting pressure in Georgia. Ralls has his eyes open for the future and his ideas appear to contain a great deal of logic, sincerity and conservation progress.

At a recent meeting of officers of Sportsmen's Clubs, where an open discussion was undertaken on the Clark Hill Project, Ralls put in some strong words for a hunting refuge to be set up in this area and to be developed.

Some 27,000 acres already have been set aside for a wildlife refuge. The objective is to have 100,000 acres where, in cooperation with the U. S. Fish & Wildlife Service, the State Game and Fish Commission can accomplish its purpose.

About 250 deer are scheduled for release in this new area. This is enough seed stock to insure deer hunting of the highest order. A limited amount of public regulated hunting under supervision possibly will be on tap after a period of five years. Undoubtedly, this is one of the greatest developments in Georgia in the last 25 years.

The Clark Hill Project is a honey. Imagine if you can the duck hunting possibilities as well as the fishing potentialities in back waters forming a lake where the Georgia shore line alone will be something like 1200 miles. Let's not day dream and become so complacent as to think the State Game & Fish Commission can accomplish this miracle alone.
