S. DEW GROOVER SPEAKS TO STILSON FARM BUREAU
S. Dew Groover asked the Stilson group to make a serious effort to increase their yield and size of the 1950 peanut crop. He recommended that the jumbo growers plant more large peanuts and mix them in with the New Holland, or smaller peanuts they are growing. He predicted that peanuts would sell for about the same price they did last year, or better. 


