



as tast as the prices increased demand for the larger

costs of producing these products are rising as tast as the prices being paid.

Under these conditions farmers have to make a good crop every year. A poor crop under such a financial structure will ruin the average farmer. With all the locally grown farm commodities being in strong demand, farmers can well afford to take a risk on trying to produce a large crop in 1951, Mr. Fanning thinks.

The value of farm property has increased materially in Georgia since 1940, but 70 per cent of this increase has been due to rise in prices, while a good feature of the present financial structure is due to the 30 per cent added to capital stock, such as tractors, livestock, and other working capital.

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





Loggerheads Still Deep-Sea Mystery

ALMOST everybody is convinced that the man who ate the first oyster was indeed an intrepid character. The gentleman who dined on the first loggerhead turtle egg must

be regarded as a chap of unquestionable courage and unflinching determination.

The egg is about the size of a golf ball with a soft, pliable shell. Before regulations were passed to protect the loggerhead eggs, some restaurants along the Georgia coast featured them.

deep-sea monster with power enough in its flippers to knock a man sprawling. Its powerful jaws could snap a broom

handle as you might snap a toothpick.

Remember post cards showing a bathing beauty riding the back of an enormous turtle?—that is old loggerhead.

An adult loggerhead could weigh 350 pounds although the average is about 250 pounds. In water it is agile and quick. No record has ever been received of a loggerhead attacking a human being in water. On land, the giant turtle is pitifully low. One can have only sympathy for it as it drags its huge body over the sand.

The fippers scratched and scraped into the sand. It gasped and groaned as if in great agony. Its breath was beavy and labored. Women in the party watched only a few moments and turned away and wept. One man filled his bat with water and spilled it over the turtle in an effort to relieve its suffering. It was generally agreed that it would be an act of extreme cruelty for anyone to attempt to ride the distressed and suffering turtle.

Mating occurs in the water early in the summer. In June, July and August, the female crawls onto the beach and into the sea oats, just out of the range of the high water mark.

Raccoons have been known to sit patiently a few feet away until the performance is complete and the hole covered, then dig up the eggs and dine. Loggerhead eggs are used by experimental biologists in embryological and physiological studies. These sea turtles have pro lactin, a hormone associated with milk production in mammals. "Why?" is an unsolved biological studies.

Loggerheads have barnacles attached which are a species seculiar to turtles alone and do not occur elsewhere. We do not know the loggerhead's habitat nor its complete diet and we assume it is safe from deep sea predators since it carries its own armour plate and would be a tough customer to






