**Ogeechee River Baptist W. M. U. Honors Memory of Mrs. Woodward**

**MEMORIAL TO MRS. A. E. WOODWARD**

"Because the memory of the past is sacred; we want to say something of Anna Woodward's testimony as she lived and served God in our midst." So she lived in the W. M. U. field from its birth, when often pastors as well as husbands denounced women's public works, until her death.

"The Ogeechee Association, she was the moving spirit during its most discouraging days. She was district secretary for 25 years and had magnificently shouldered the 1950 responsibilities of that office. But she was a former W. M. U. Association Superintendent and as long as she lived, she had a hand in the overall engagement and loyal aid to Mrs. E. A. Smith. At the same time she was president of her local W. M. U. and often leader for one or more of its auxiliaries.

"She was sociable and pleasant wherever we saw her; she was so humble that she undervalued her own leadership and she served the Lord. She was guileless in her life and conversation which gained for her the love and devotion of four generations who knew and worked with her. She was tenderhearted and compassionate with those in trouble. Her teaching was so simple, direct and sincere that it moved and stirred hearts so that many were brought to serve God.

"She welcomed the newcomer; she encouraged the beginner; she made the young to feel that a whole lifetime of joyous service lay ahead; she challenged each to be her alert talent for the ongoing of Christ's kingdom as she persuaded others to help in establishing churches, procuring pastors, organizing W. M. U. societies in many churches, teaching Sunday School or leading young people organizations.

"Why did God give success to her endeavors for Him so that she was able to see some of the fruit of her labors? Because as a young girl she accepted Christ as her life and her hope; because she trusted Him implicitly not only during calm, prosperous times. She believed that when the mind at-tempts continually to believe and become, and she sought always to attend to the service of Christ that through her others might come to know Him.

"In our last district meeting just before she pronounced the benediction she challenged all present to persevere in praying. "Two years ago she had pled for intercessory prayers which she knew could penetrate hearts that mortals alone could not reach. Especially did she say that our prayers would shield and comfort and follow our missionaries and thereby lift their burdens. She could not understand why any Christian did not always want to pray. She set us the example of giving thanks to God for his loving care.

"A few Sundays before she fell she told the class she was teaching at Sunday School that a sim-

# Chip Deep, Chip Often On Way Out

The old "chip deep and chip often" method of producing gum is rapidly giving way to a new, more economical method of bark chipping with acid stimulation, Dorey Dyer, extension forester, told a group of naval stores producers here last week from six counties.

Acid treatment means spraying a 50 per cent solution of sulfuric acid on the freshly chipped streak. This is a proven method which gives good results. C. J. Martin, a gum producer from Nevils, said that it increases the amount of timber one man could handle by 100 per cent. Some of the men on his farm stopped up the cups they were working from 4,500 to 9,000. The gum producer who bark chips and treats with acid, one streak every 14 days, will apply about 16 streaks during the usual gum-flowing season. A season's work of 16 streaks will produce as much gum as 32 regular untreated streaks.

This method of working timber, from the naval stores plant. Information on this method of producing gum can be procured through the county agent's office.
