A WEEK or two ago we wrote an editorial. We are beginning to wonder if anyone read it. Some did, but it is evident that those it would affect most did not.

It was just a short piece, written mainly because the matter was brought to our attention. And what was it about? Shooting birds within the city limits by the younger kids with rifles and BB air guns.

That in itself doesn't sound so bad. Most young kids do it, have done it, and will continue to do it. Even we are guilty of it, in our younger days.

But it must be stopped within the city limits and around areas where there are houses. And the only ones to stop it are the parents. If your kid must shoot, carry him out into the wide open spaces.

And why are we so upset over this matter? At first, we were concerned for the young birds and wildlife that we are so

fortunate to have with us. Certainly, we want to keep all birds and wildlife that are a pleasure to have. But it has gone further than that.

Only luck prevented a tragedy last week. And we are upset.

Last week a young mother and little boy were out in the yard watering flowers. Out of nowhere came a sharp "zing" and a dull "thud." The sharp "zing" was a bullet and the dull "thud" was the same bullet as it buried itself... no, not in the young mother or small boy... but in the tree by which they were standing... and the mother and boy were standing only a few feet part... the bullet went between them...

Shooting birds???... It could be tragic... let's stop it... PARENTS... Take your kids out where they will shoot only birds...

12 Rules To Avoid Old Age
