Time is an essential element and I know that I can depend upon your immediate active support that Red Cross responsibilities will be fully carried out."

The telegram was signed by W. W. Jefferson, area manager, Atlanta.

Mr. Christian states that statistics show that four state are included in the midwest flood area-Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma, and Illinois. Fifty-two thousand families are affected with 1,588 homes destroyed and 20,000 homes damaged. The estimated flood damage is \$1,000,000,000.
