T.O. Wynn Annual Host At 1951 'Cooter' Supper

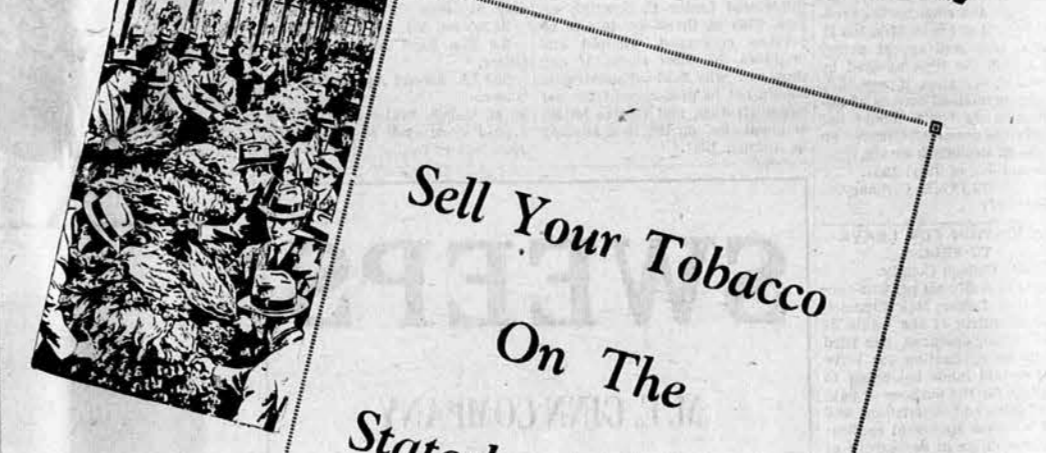

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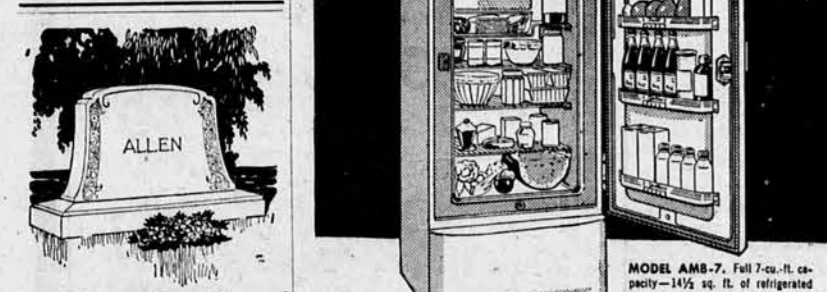
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
