Soil erosion, the bodily displacement of soil by water and wind, is as old as agriculture. When the land surface was first bared of its protective vegetation—as it had to be under cultivation—the soil was exposed to the abrasive action of the elements. In a natural undisturbed environment the soil is protected from erosion by its vegetative cover with its canopy of leaves, its stems, ground cover of litter and underground network of binding roots.






