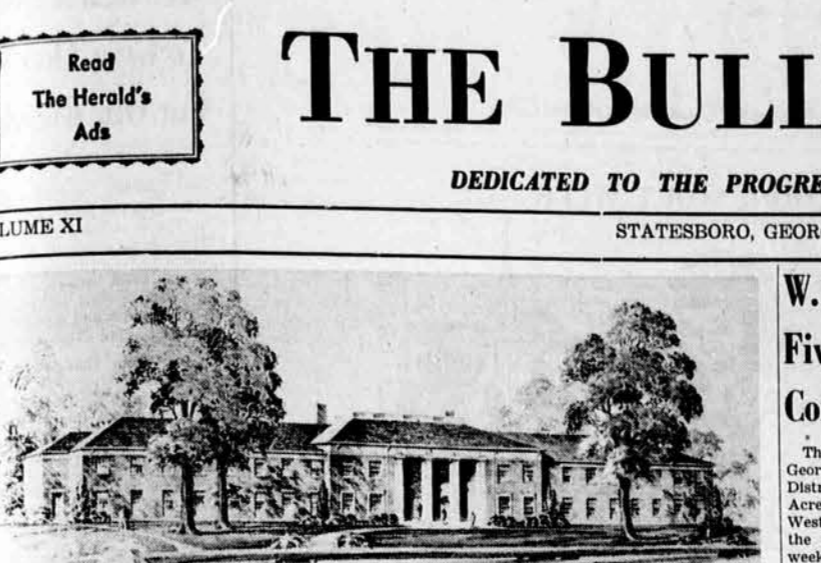

**Blue Devils Eke Out 7-6 Win Vs Vidalia**

Blocking an extra point attempt in the last seconds of the game saved the Statesboro Blue Devils from a tie with the Vidalia Indians, last Friday night, October 26, on Memorial Park Field in Statesboro.

"The Blue Devils eked out a 7-6 victory in one of the hardest fought games of the season. In the first quarter neither team scored, but Vidalia threatened to cross the Blue Devils' goal several times.

Again in the second quarter, Vidalia threatened but penalties against the Indians and a strong Statesboro defense held them scoreless.

Half-time score: Statesboro, 0; Vidalia, 0.

The third quarter was a defensive battle with neither team threatening to score.

Late in the last quarter Statesboro drove to the Vidalia 38-yard line and the Devils scored from there. Statesboro quarterback Sid Waters threw a long pass to half-back Joe Ben Cassidy, who received the ball on the Vidalia 10 and kicked.

The Blue Devils play Lyons here tomorrow (Friday) night.

Jere Fletcher booted the extra point and Statesboro led 7 to 0.

The Blue Devils kicked off to Vidalia. James Walden ran the kick back 45 yards to the 50-yard line. A 15-yard penalty against the Devils moved the ball to Statesboro's 35. Vidalia drove down to the eight on runs by Bobby McGowan and Douglas Williams but the Blue Devil line held.

After three long passes were dropped in the end zone by Vidalia, McGowan threw to Jimmy Williams for a score. A charge by Bruce Waters was admitted to the extra point. The game ended seconds later.

Final score: Statesboro, 7; Vidalia, 6.

Freddie Stewart and Jimmy Glouster were the defensive standouts for Vidalia.

Outstanding players on defense for the Blue Devils were tackle Bud Johnston an Jack Bowen, center Ferrel Parrish, and end Benny Brant.

Joe Ben Cassidy, ace Devil half-back, averaged eight yards per carry against the Indians. He gained the ball ten times and carried a total of 80 yards.

Vidalia racked up 12 first downs and the Blue Devils pushed over six.

**W. H. Smith Jr. Five-Acre Cotton Contest Winner**

Three outstanding Southeast Georgia farmers are winners of District awards in the State Five-Acre Cotton Contest for 1951. E. C. Westbrook, cotton specialist for the Extension Service, said this week.

W. H. Smith Jr., Bulloch county, topped all producers in the 27-county area with a 11,771-pound yield from five acres. He receives a \$250 cash award.

Second place winner in the district is Joseph R. Ellison, Screven county, with a yield of 11,552 pounds, and third prize goes to Segal Durrence, Tallapoosa county, producing 11,127 pounds of seed cotton on five acres.

Ellison receives \$150 and Durrence \$100. The contest is sponsored by the Georgia Cottonseed Crushers Association. Awards are to be made at a meeting in Atlanta, December 13, Westbrook said.

To win the top award in the contest, Ellison planted 100 Wilt seed on April 2. He fertilized with 1,200 pounds of 4-8-8 per acre plus ammonium nitrate and muriate of potash as side dressing. The fertilizer cost \$29.20 per acre.

The prize-winning field was poisoned for insects three times at a cost of \$2.22 per acre.

Mr. Smith owns and operates a 337-acre farm with 300 acres in crops. He planted 65 acres of cotton, 100 Wilt and 1,500 Hogs.

Mr. Ellison also planted Coker's 100 Wilt and used \$19.50 worth of fertilizer per acre. He did not find it necessary to poison for insects. His average is around a bushel per acre on 40 acres of cotton this year. He also grows corn, peanuts, hogs, and hay.

Third prize winner, Mr. Durrence, used the same variety of cotton, applied \$15.85 worth of fertilizer and applied boll weevil poison twice. On 100 Wilt cotton this year he grew 90 acres of cotton and produced 90 bales. He also grows corn, small grains, beef cattle, and hogs.

The state champion in the Five-Acre Cotton Contest is to be announced at the December 13 meeting in Atlanta. Other district winners are to be announced prior to that time. The state winner receives a \$500 cash award.

A Bulloch county farmer, A. S. Hunicutt Sr., won the 1950 state contest with a yield of 11 bales on five acres.

**Need a Social Security Number?**

Are you one of the millions of self-employed people newly covered under Federal Old-Age and Survivors Insurance? If so, you need a Social Security account number, according to Mr. C. A. Hamilton, manager of the Savannah Social Security office.

Self-employed people who were brought under the Social Security Act by last year's changes in the law will report their net income from self-employment at the same time they make their income tax returns early next year, Mr. Hamilton said. "At that time, they will enter their Social Security numbers on the tax form, together with other information."

Mr. Hamilton indicated that although the numbers will not actually be needed until early next year, self-employed businessmen should apply for them in the near future. This will help avoid any delay when the numbers are needed.

"If you have ever had a social security number, that same number should be used," Mr. Hamilton said. "If you have lost your card, you can get a copy of your number bearing that same number."

Both new and duplicate cards can be obtained through the Savannah Social Security office. The address in Savannah is Room 6, Post Office Building.

Mr. Hamilton asks all self-employed businessmen who have any questions about their coverage under Social Security to get in touch with this office.

**Will Smith Speaks At College Monday**

Two colleges which Georgians frequently confuse as being the same will get better acquainted Monday.

President William S. Smith of South Georgia College will speak at Georgia Teachers College in chapel exercises recognizing graduates of his college who now attend Teachers College.

Many of the upperclassmen here typically transfer from South Georgia, a junior college at Douglas County, to Georgia Teachers College. Most of the confusion about the separate identities of the colleges dates from the 1930s when the Statesboro institution bore the name South Georgia Teachers College.

**First Baptist Rally Day Will Feature Laying Cornerstone Of New Church**

The 1951 Rally Day at the First Baptist Church which will be observed Sunday, November 4, will have an added feature this year with the laying of the cornerstone for the \$150,000 church sanctuary.

With T. J. Morris, A. C. Bradley and C. B. McAllister heading the General Rally Day Committee, the Baptists have set a goal of \$25,000 for Sunday which will go into the building fund.

Sunday's program will begin with Sunday School at 10 a. m. with the cornerstone laying scheduled for 10:45. Rev. George Lovell, Jr., H. L. Brannen, chairman of the Building Committee, and W. C. Cobb, chairman of the Board of Deacons, will participate in the ceremony. All important documents concerning the building, a copy of the constitution, pictures, accounts of the church, newspaper clippings, and a Bible, will be placed in a steel box and sealed at the cornerstone.

A notecard with the names of the cornerstone laying ceremonies which will be conducted at Georgia Teachers College auditorium where morning worship will be held. Evening services will be held in a tent (weather permitting) at which time new deacons will be ordained and the Lord's Supper observed.

The First Baptist Church was organized in 1882, with W. M. Cowart, R. J. Williams, W. C. Cowart, and J. A. Scarborough as the presbytery. The first pastor was W. M. Cowart, and Edmund Kennedy and A. B. Miller served as deacons. The charter members were Joseph Tillman, W. B. Corey, James Price, W. J. M. Griner, Moseley Miller, Mary T. Mann, Elizabeth Kennedy, and d Mary J. Proctor.

# It Could Be Dangerous

WE DO NOT KNOW the reasoning supporting it, if any. We cannot see the advantages of recommending it, if any.

But, because the Democratic Executive Committee has met and decided so, Bulloch county will hold its county primary 13 months before those elected will begin their terms of office, on January 1, 1953.

It would be interesting to know why we must elect our county officials that far in advance of their terms of office.

Such an early primary seems unwise to us.

If an incumbent is a candidate and is re-elected, then it would make no difference.

But sometimes incumbents are not re-elected when they are candidates to succeed themselves.

And here it is that the danger lies. A public official defeated in a primary with a year and one month of his term to serve before his successor moves into the office, can be dangerous to the community.

Unless his character be of stern stuff, unless he holds his community close to his heart... unless he has high regard for the responsibilities of his office... unless he has a deep feeling of sincerity for the performance of his duty, he can wreak havoc during the last months of his term.

A sheriff, defeated for re-election, could get rich during the balance of his term.

A clerk of the Superior Court could leave the records of a county in a hopeless mess in 13 months before his successor assumes office.

A chairman of the county board of commissioners could bankrupt a county in the time left of his term.

A solicitor could foul up that office that his successor might not clean up in years.

An ordinary could neglect his responsibilities that his successor would feel like starting from scratch.

A county school superintendent could tear down an entire school system, leaving little foundation upon which his successor might try to rebuild.

We don't say it always happens thus. Bulloch county is fortunate.

Every official now serving Bulloch county would continue serving with the same high degree of responsibility he or she is now serving, regardless of the outcome of the primary.

That is our conviction.

And there are counties about which this cannot be said.

And it is entirely possible that there could be a time when it would fall down here.

Could not our Democratic Executive Committee explore the possibility of calling our primary later, and nearer the date on which our officials begin their terms, and not on a date to conflict with state elections?

It would make for less confusion in the minds of our citizens. Even now, many think that following the primary on November 28 the officials will begin their new terms of office on January 1, 1952.

There's nothing to favor such an early primary.

There's much against it.

## We Learn the Hard Way

WE LEARN the hard way.

It took the death of 35 and the hospitalization and home care of 350 people in Atlanta to prove that rotgut moonshine whiskey will kill you.

And on Wednesday of last week the drinking public in Georgia's capital city had learned their lesson well, for on that day the evening watch of the Atlanta police department received only one call to arrest a drunk.

Usually the arrests for drunkenness from 3 p. m. until 11 p. m. number 50 to 100.

Police officers said that instead of drinking, loiterers about beer halls read the latest developments on the poison liquor disaster in the newspapers and listened to the radio and watched television broadcasts.

By Sunday the men responsible for mixing methyl (wood) alcohol, moonshine, and well water, and selling it for whisky—which caused the death of 35 and the illness and suffering of 350 more—had been caught.

Moonshine whiskey is sold in every section of Georgia.

Despite the constant vigilance of our local authorities it is still manufactured and sold in Bulloch county.

And now, when a person buys a pint of the white lightning, or cool corn, or whatever name it might go by, he can never be sure that it'll not lay him out cold, cold, cold.

Doubt now grins on the rim of every fruit jar of the poison stuff, and death lurks therein.
