Hi-Y Youths Take Over Legislature

Announcement was made this week by Kemp Mabry, Southeastern District secretary of YMCA, with headquarters in Statesboro, that four Statesboro youth have been selected to represent two Bulloch county schools at the Seventh Georgia Hi-Y Youth Assembly at the state capitol in Atlanta on December 7 and 8.
Harville Hendrix of the Statesboro Hi-Y, will "serve" in the House of Representatives, and Betty Young of Statesboro will "sit" in the press section. From the Laboratory High School Hi-Y, Jerry Anderson will "serve" in the House of Representatives and Rat Rountree will "sit" in the press section.
Two years ago the "pint-size assembly" passed a bill requiring pre-marital health examinations. This measure has since been enacted into law by the regular Georgia legislature.
This youth and government project is conducted by the YMCA to give youth actual experience in good government and lawmaking. Twenty-six other states have similar Hi-Y legislatures.
Present plans call for televising part of the proceedings.
Another Hi-Y conference will be held at Statesboro High School for new clubs in Bulloch and surrounding counties on Saturday, December 15. This will be a training conference for the new clubs and will include Portal, Register, Groover, Metter, Swainsboro and Laboratory High School.

Jaycees Endorse School Bond Issue For Bulloch

After hearing two of the county's leading school authorities speak on the forthcoming school bond issue, the Statesboro Junior Chamber of Commerce, based on the number of members contacted, have unanimously endorsed the \$800,000 school bond issue to be voted on December 21.
Everett Williams, chairman of the county board of education, and H. P. Womack, county school superintendent, were guest speakers at the regular meeting of the Statesboro Junior Chamber of Commerce last Thursday, November 29.
Mr. Womack reviewed the work of the Bulloch County School Survey Committee and the recommendations following the committee's findings. He outlined the program worked out for Bulloch county to give equal educational opportunities to all the children of all the people of the county.
Mr. Williams explained the school bond issue election to be held here on Friday, December 21.
He stated the voters of the county would be asked to approve a bond issue of \$800,000, to be repaid in thirty years, using funds from the Minimum Foundation Program. He explained that under the program the county gets \$200 per year per teacher for capital outlay, which amounts to about \$44,000 a year. This is much more than enough to make the average annual principal and interest payments over the lifetime of the bond issue at 2 1/2% for the first 15 years and 2% for the last 15 years.
He explained that the county can save \$182,110 by this type of bond issue instead of borrowing money to build the needed buildings from the School Building Authority, which would mean a 4% interest rate with average annual principal and interest payment of \$45,564.
At a board meeting of the Jaycees Tuesday night the bond issue was endorsed. Wednesday morning the membership of the organization had unanimously endorsed the bond issue, based on the number of members who had been personally interviewed and indicated their approval.

Stockholders and fans who attended the meeting last Tuesday night were enthusiastic over the prospects of Statesboro entering a team in the Georgia State League. More than 45 season tickets were sold at the meeting called on Sunday, December 9, at 4 p. m. All members and friends are urged to be present.
Mr. McAllister went on to say that if enough season tickets are sold by next Tuesday night the pilots will be playing in a new league next year. The Georgia State League is a class D professional league and is a step up from the old Ogechee League of which Statesboro was a former member.

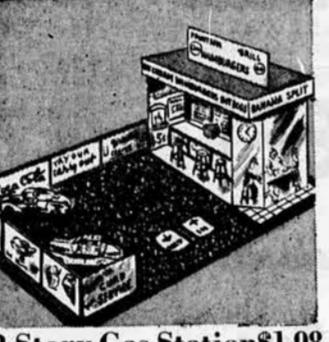

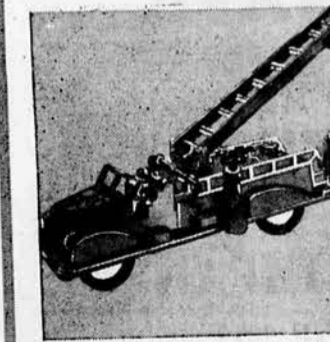
