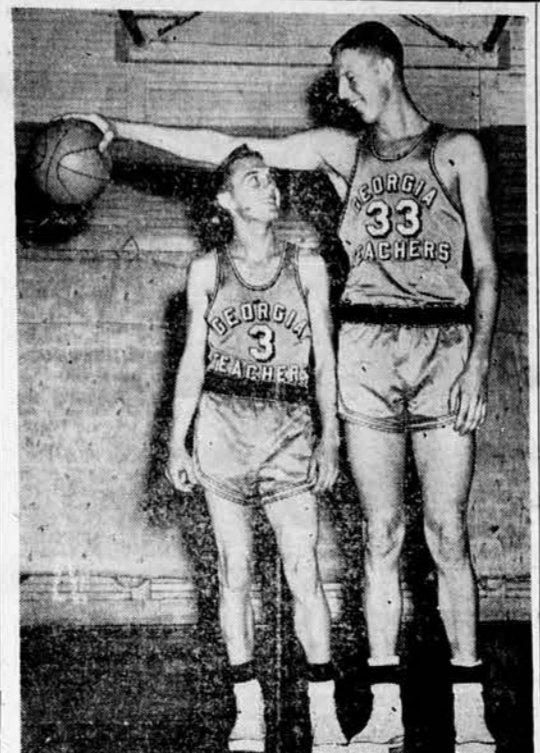

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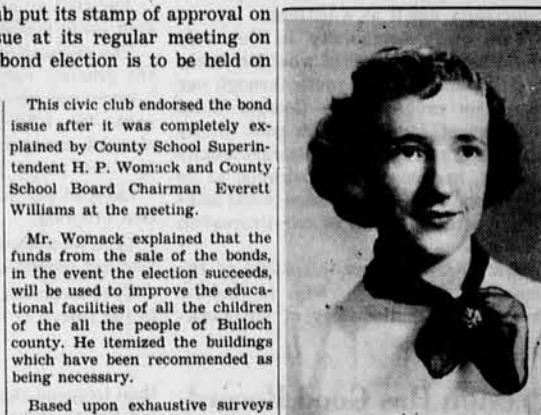
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James W. Mikell Is Commended

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Name 4 Georgia 4-H Winners



Sara F. Fletcher, 17, of Chula, was named state winner in the 4-H Frozen Foods program. Donor of a 17-jewel wrist watch award was International Harvester. Skill developed in preparing and packaging foodstuffs for freezing has added desirable variety to the home-raised supply, and has reduced the cash outlay for foods. It has also helped provide the family with a well-balanced diet at all times. A club member for seven years, Sara Frances has been working in Frozen Foods the past three years. Since twice as much can be frozen in the time taken for canning, she no longer uses that method except for those foods which will not endure freezing. She has frozen 1,162 pounds of meat and 888 packages of frozen vegetables, and the state medal both in 1950 and 1951. Sara Frances enrolled at Georgia Teachers College in September.

Better methods of doing every-day homemaking skills proved to be a challenge to Eula Lee Cochran, 17, of Athens. Her selection as state winner in the 4-H Girls Record program proves that this young miss is a first-rate housekeeper and manager. She has made 152 garments, harvested 2,951 pounds of garden produce, put up 1,423 cans of food, raised 460 fowl, and carried on soil conservation, home improvement, and safety activities in seven years of 4-H Club work. Eula has served her club as reporter, program chairman, and project chairman, and was secretary of the northern Georgia Council for two years. In addition Eula has given 80 talks and written 15 news stories about 4-H work. If all the forestland in the United States were divided equally, each Bulloch county citizen would own a blackened waste of our woodlands.

You, the Bulloch county citizens, can help prevent forest fires. In so doing, you are helping not only your community and the Bulloch County Forestry Unit, but yourself as well.

In actual practice, however, some of our citizens own less and some more. Each of us, though, no matter whether we own great or small forest areas, or none at all, has a practical responsibility for helping the Bulloch County Forestry Unit keep the 284,083 acres which form this county's forests green and growing.

None of us needs to be a forest owner to benefit from healthy, productive tree crops. All of us use, in our daily lives, so many products made from wood—products ranging from clothing to writing paper—that the forest in this area can be looked upon as one of Bulloch county's greatest natural resources.

Complete control of wildfire in our woodlands cannot come about until each citizen realizes the importance to himself and his community, not of four acres, not of 40 acres, nor of 400, but of all 284,083 acres of this county's forestland.

One match or cigarette carelessly discarded along the highway from a speeding automobile could bring devastation to many of those acres in our county. One campfire left unattended could destroy trees in our county which have been decades in growing. One brushfire

This edict proved to be very unpopular with the masses of the people. It was not until many years later, however, that Christmas was once again regarded as a holiday.

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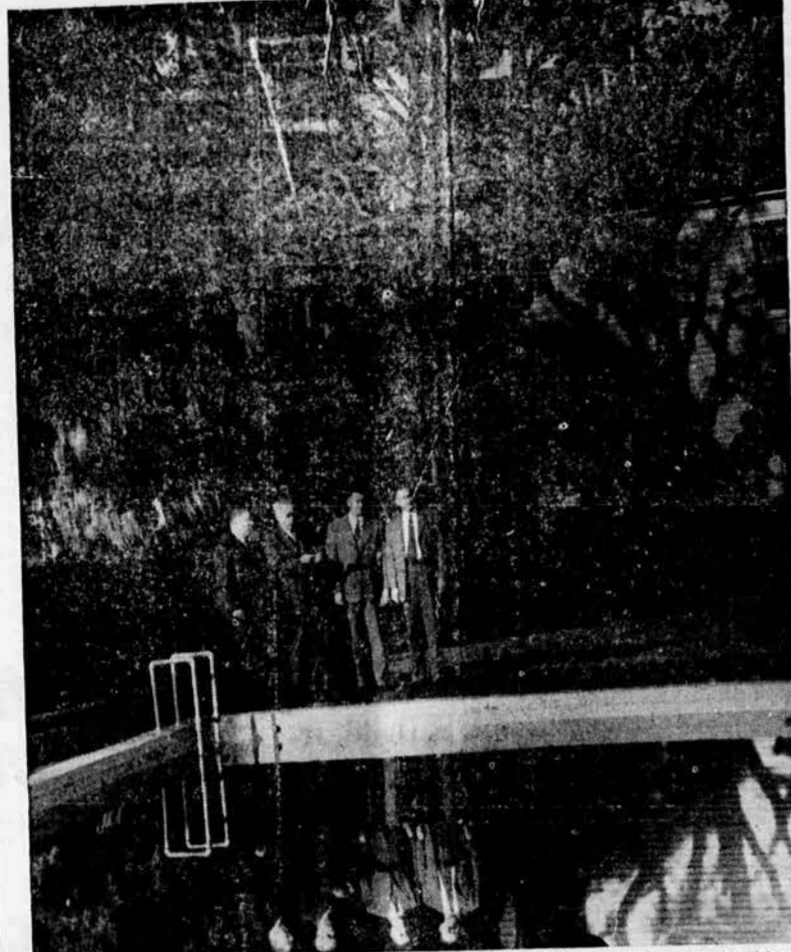
When Not Teaching, TC Teachers Are Evaluating

When they aren't teaching, teachers at Teachers College this year are evaluating. Evaluation, or stock taking, always has been part of the teaching process, but the formal evaluation now engaging the teachers is the largest one ever undertaken by the Teachers College or similar institutions.

All 75 faculty members are active participants. Divided into seven committees, they are working before, between, and after classes—sometimes as late as midnight—in a "self-evaluation" of the college. Their job will continue until their report is evaluated in turn in 1953 by a committee of visiting educators.

The aim is to examine the policies and practices of the college and to implement or improve them wherever necessary. As much improvement as possible is supposed to be made before the visiting committee comes.

...there is a Santa Claus!

YES, VIRGINIA

"Yes, indeed! "Virginia, your little friends are wrong. They have been affected by the skepticism of a skeptical age—they do not believe except what they see—they think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible by their little minds.



"All minds, Virginia, whether they be men's or children's, are little.

"In this great universe of ours, man is a mere insect, an ant, in his intellect as compared with the boundless world about him, as measured by the intelligence capable of grasping the whole of truth and knowledge.

"Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus.

"He exists as certainly as love and generosity and devotion exist, and you know that they abound and give to your life its highest beauty and joy. Alas! how dreary would be the world if there were no Santa Claus! It would be as dreary as if there were no Virginias. There would be no childlike faith then, no poetry, no romance to make tolerable this existence. We should have no enjoyment, except in sense and sight. The eternal light which childhood fills the world would be extinguished.



It was only September, and 1897's Christmas was three months in the future. But Virginia O'Hanlon's concern was with an important problem that, to her, knew no season. That was why she wrote her letter to the New York Sun.

The answer to Virginia's question, written in a moment of deep spiritual insight by Francis B. Church, stands even today as a testament expressing two thousand years of faith. It has been reprinted here because it always will deserve to be read again.

"Not believe in Santa Claus! You might as well not believe in fairies!

"You might get your papa to hire men to watch in all the chimneys on Christmas Eve to



catch Santa Claus, but even if they did not see Santa Claus coming down, what would that prove? Nobody sees Santa Claus, but that is no sign that there is no Santa Claus—the most real things in the world are those neither children nor men can see.

"Did you ever see fairies dancing on the lawn? Of course not, but that's no proof that they are not there—nobody can conceive or imagine all the wonders that are unseen and unseeable in the world.

"You tear apart the baby's rattle and see what makes the noise inside, but there is a veil covering the unseen world which not the strongest man, or even the united strength of all the strongest men, that ever lived, could tear apart. Only faith, fancy, poetry, love, romance, can push aside the curtain and view and picture the supernal beauty and glory beyond.



"Is it all real?—ah, Virginia, in all this world there is nothing else real and abiding.

"No Santa Claus! Thank God!—he lives, and he lives forever—a thousand years from now, Virginia, say, ten thousand years from now, he will continue to make glad the heart of childhood."
