





When Not Teaching, TC **Teachers Are Evaluating**

When they aren't teaching, teachers at Teachers College this year are evaluating.

Evaluation, or stocki taking, always has been part of the teaching process, but the formal evaluation now engaging the teachers is the largest one ever undertaken by the Teachers College or similar institutions.

All 75 faculty members are active participants. Divided into seven committees, they are working before, between, and after classes—sometimes as late as midnight—in a "self-evaluation" of the college. Their job will continue until their report is evaluated in turn in 1953 by a committee of visiting educators.

The aim is to examine the policies and practices of the college and to implement or improve them wherever necessary. As much improvement as possible is supposed to be made before the visiting committee comes.


