#### THE ELLIS HEALTH LAW

When the Grand Jury convenes next week no more important matter will be brought up for consideration than the Ellis Health Law. We are well aware of the fact that this important measure has been presented in the past, and though two former Grand Juries have recommended its adoption, necessary steps were never made to set up a County Health Department. This negligence might have been due to indifference on the part of our leading citizens, or it might have reflected the sentiment of the county as a whole, but whatever the reason for inaction on such an important program we are assured that the time is now ripe for a complete reversal of past conviction as to the wisdom and necessity of setting up a Health Program paralleling that of the State. The strongest evidence of this awakened interest is that magnificent structure erected recently, The Bulloch County Hospital. Surely since there was a solidarity of opinion in the matter of treating and caring for the sick that resulted in this substantial building which when completed will furnish hospitalization equal to the best the state affords there will be no difficulty in setting up a program which tends to safeguard public health.

The widespread benefits to the people of a county from the installation of a properly organized health unit was emphasized in recent speech made before the Chamber of Commerce by Dr. M. E. Winchester, health officer of Glynn county. Dr. Winchester came to Statesboro after having been urged to do so by the Chamber of Commerce and the County Commissioners. He has won state-wide acctaim and national prominence for the splendid work he has done in Glynn county, in completely ridding the county of small pox, reducing tubercular cases until Glynn county has the lowest tuberculosis record in Georgia, and having malarial cases almost under control.

What Dr. Winchester has done in Glynn county can be done in Bulloch county. We proudly point to the record we have established in our hog sales; we are acknowledged leaders in poultry production; our tobacco markets are steadily forging to the front; a building program is being inaugurated which reflects prosperity; we are inviting manufacturing enterprises by our tax-exemption plan; surely these advances in a commercial way will be accompanied by a corresponding advance along lines of public health. Our interest in the health of our children should surpass our interest in improving livestock. The first consideration of every community should be for the health of its citizens, and counties that do not avail themselves of the opportunity to secure a health unit under the supervision of the state board are endangering not only themselves but those of other sections for disease is no respector of county lines.

went on record as approving the entry of Bulloch county in the Progressive Government Awards which is being sponsored by the Atlanta Constitution.

It was pointed out at the meeting that there has already been made many improvements in the county government of Bulloch for the first four months of 1937 and many more will be made during the remaining

As presented in our first issue this Progressive Government Awards was announced by the Atlanta Constitution, offering \$7,-500 for the 13 Georgia counties making improvements in governments during 1937, which result in the greatest benefits to their citizens. The purpose of the awards are to extend and intensify progress in better government, to stimulate state-wide interest on the part of the public in governmental affairs and to give recognition to improvements in county governmental conditions in the state's 159 counties.

Never before in the history of Georgia or the south has a similar interest been displayed in county governments. The Atlanta Constitution's announcement of its awards has created nation-wide interest because of the fact that a great metropolitan daily newspaper has dedicated itself to a program to improve county governments by stimulating cooperation between officials and their con-

Every county will ram. It may be that aid to diversified farming may bring the greatest benefits to the citizens of the county; that animal husbandry is the proper way to approach the problem; that institution of modern and efficient methods into the government itself is the answer in some counties. Whatever line of activity is taken is left entirely at the discretion of the county commissioners themselves and the citizens of the county.

The details of the County Awards are as

1. \$7,500 in cash will be awarded to the 13 Georgia counties making improvements in county government during the year which bring the greatest benefits to their citizens.

2. Awards will be as follows: A. FIRST AWARD, \$3,500.

SECOND AWARD, \$1,000. THIRD AWARD, \$500.

D. THE SUM OF \$250 will be awarded in addition to the county in each of the ten congressional districts of the state making the most progress in behalf of its citizens. Winners of either of the first three awards will not be considered for district

3. Awards shall be based solely on proggress, improvement, advancement and efficiency which bring the greatest benefits to the public.

4. Impartial judges will decide which counties are entitled to the awards, and their decision shall be final. Names of prominent Georgians, who will act as judges, will be

5. Any progress noted in any county automatically makes that county ELIGIBLE and that county will be CONSIDERED by the judges in making the awards. Thus every county in Georgia will be a candidate for the awards and will be considered by the

6. Judges will make a survey of accomplishments of every county in Georgia, and from the findings of this survey, the awards will be made.

7. Each county will evolve its own program. The Constitution will not attempt to make any suggestion as to what should be done. Improvements are to be left entirely to commissioners and citizens of various counties.
