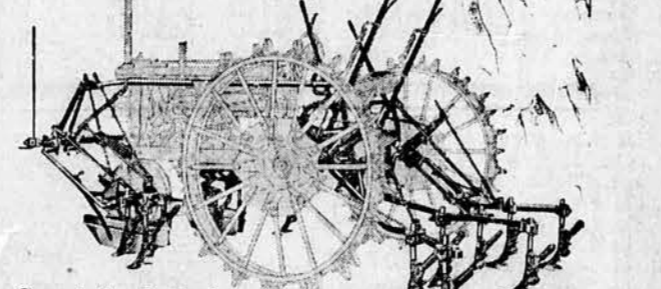

According to a statement made here this week by Demonstrator Strickland of Claxton, the tobacco crop this season will be reduced to half the acreage of last season. Mr. Strickland has made a close observa-tion throughout his demonstrating territory, consisting of about 65 or 80 tobacco farms, and recorded the results. His records show that out of the sixty farmers only a very few have not begun setting their plants yet. Although many of them have much less than an acre set. A very few have already finished trans-planting, unless they get some plants from an unforeseen source, which is almost an impossibility at the pres-ent time. The thing most fatal to the tobacco plants of our section was the blue mold but now it is generally believed that this disease has some-what subsided.

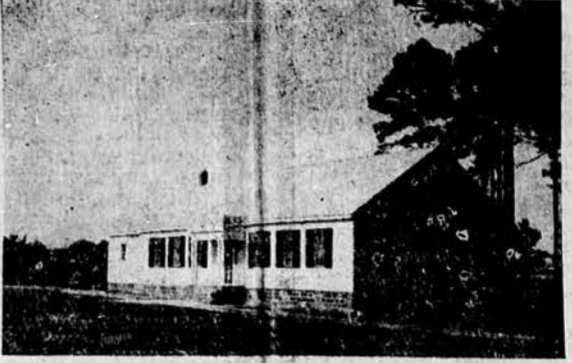
