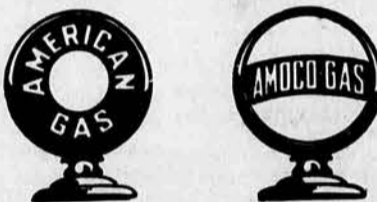
W. C. HODGES ON G. C. P. A. BOARD

Good temporary pastures offer cheap feed, according to O. C. Banks who is grazing 60 cows on 40 acres of millet. Mr. Banks says that the grazing will hold for three months.

L. M. Etheridge has a carpet grass and lespedeza pasture that gives grazing from early spring until fall.

F. Martin says that one form of insurance on the farm is to paint the home; L. L. Clifton adds that it increases the value of the property besides making it a better place to live. J. O. Alford thinks that the family gets more personal pleasure out of the home by painting the inside of the house.

John H. Brannen has an idea that painting the roofs of the outbuildings helps add to their life. W. C. Hodges and W. W. Robertson have found a place in the farming program for sheep. Mr. Hodges markets lambs and wool while Mr. Robertson has found a special market for his wool by having it manufactured into blankets and selling them at a fair price.

NOTICE OF ELECTION GEORGIA—Bulloch County: To the Qualified Voters of the Warnock Consolidated School District:

Notice is hereby given that on Tuesday, July 6th, 1937, an election will be held at the school house in said district within the legal hours for holding such an election, for the purpose of determining whether or not bonds in the amount of four thousand five hundred (\$4,500) dollars shall be issued for the purpose of building and equipping a school auditorium and the building and equipping of additional rooms for the present school building for said school district.

The bonds to be so voted on are to be nine in number, of the denomination of five hundred dollars each and to bear interest from date at the rate of five percent per annum, interest payable annually on July 1st of each year; the principal to mature and be paid off as follows: Bond numbered one on July 1, 1938; and the remaining eight bonds, in numerical order, one bond on July 1st of each year thereafter for eight consecutive years, so that the whole amount will have been paid off by July 1, 1946.

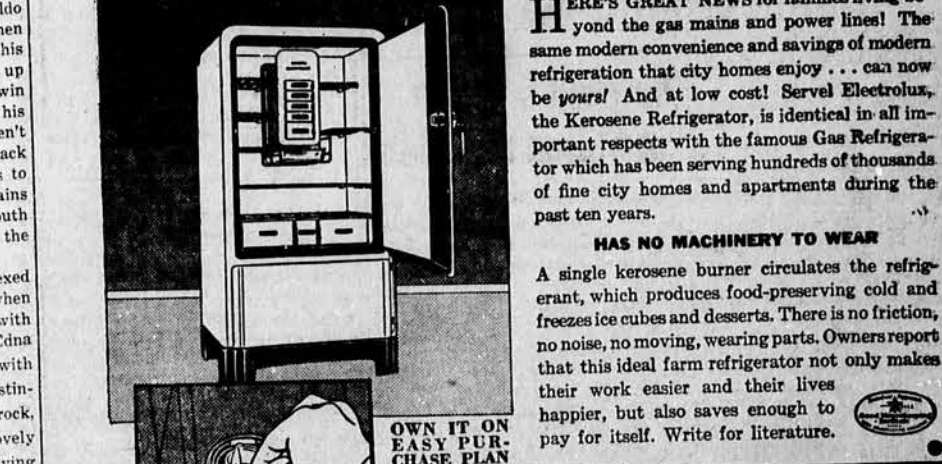
