X-Ray Company; The ward equipment to be furnished by the Wachtel Supply Company of Savannah has not been ordered.

The construction work being done by Averitt Bros. and Sargent is 90 percent complete and with a few finishing touches on the basement floor will be ready for use.

To those who have not seen the hospital equipment there is a pleasant surprise in store.

Canning Plant at Nevils by P. T. A.

The most outstanding piece of work that G. C. Avery, our vocational agriculture teacher has done this season for the welfare of the community, is to operate the canning plant that has been recently installed by the Nevils Parent Teacher Association.

This plant is equipped with a steel canning retort with a fifty-eight No. 2 can capacity, combined with a six cup cook stove embedded in a brick furnace of regular dimensions. Accompanying this we have a ten gallon galvanized vessel to place on this stove for heating water.

Everybody is invited to come and bring your vegetables and fruits ready prepared for the can, and gathered on the same day of canning for best results. No food is guaranteed to keep that's allowed to stand over night before canning.

The operation of this canning plant will be under the administration of G. C. Avery, assisted by Mrs. Avery. You may get your food canned at a small cost. The No. 2 cans will cost only 3 cents each, and the No. 3 cans cost only 4 cents each.

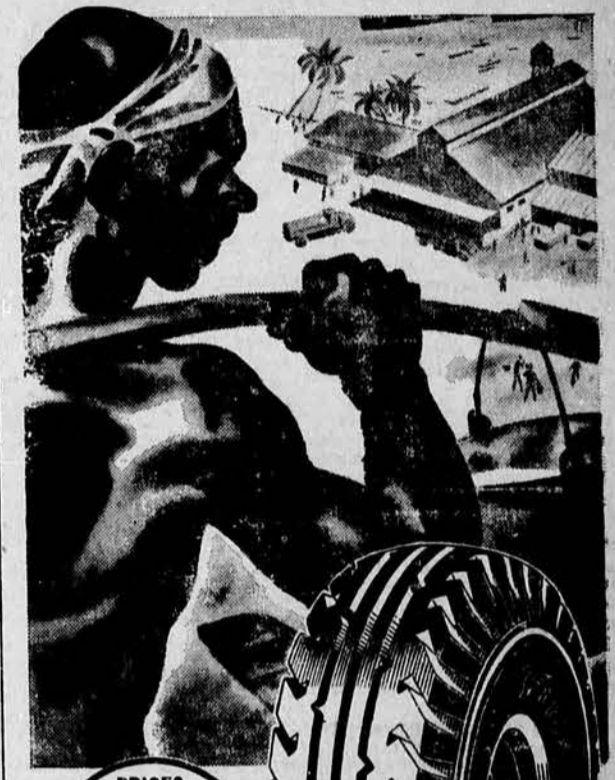

Hon. Roy V. Harris July 4th Speaker

"WE NEED TO DECLARE OUR ECONOMIC INDEPENDENCE IN GEORGIA AND BUILD NEW ECONOMIC SYSTEM," HARRIS IN ADDRESS.

Hon. Roy V. Harris, speaker of the House of Representatives, told a Fourth of July audience of 744 Georgia school teachers here Monday that we must have a new economic system in Georgia unless we are to be continued to be called backward. Speaker Harris, who returned on Sunday from the bedside of Governor Rivers in California spoke to the summer session students at the South Georgia Teachers College on Monday. Preceding the Speaker, Hon. A. M. Deal, representative from this county, in the General Assembly, gave a brief talk on patriotism. Both men were presented by President Marvin S. Pittman. Harris told the teachers that the men of 1776 had ideals and courage, that they were not milk fed, and that they spoke out and were not in fear of losing their jobs or their possessions. He stated that type of men in Georgia today. Men, according to the Speaker, who are not afraid to get their hands soiled by politics, men who are not afraid to speak their minds for fear loss of a job.

"We need to declare our economic independence in Georgia and build a new economic system," Mr. Harris declared. "We must undertake some of the ambitious programs that have been put into effect in other states. We have the ability and the money and to you—our school teachers—rest the task of educating our people to appreciate these problems," he said. Speaker Harris told the audience that for the first time in more than a week, Governor Rivers, is out of danger. He stated that the people of Georgia did not realize how near they came to losing a Governor.

Charlie Carter Is Brought From Ohio

WANTED IN BURNING FRANK HUGHES HOME IN BROOKLET. THREE OTHERS IMPLICATED.

Solicitor General W. G. Neville and Sheriff L. M. Mallard returned to Statesboro, Wednesday, from Dayton Ohio, where they went to get Charlie Carter, who is wanted in connection with the Frank Hughes burning in this county in June. Several weeks ago a preliminary hearing was given here for Grady Lewis, A. B. Zippere, and Donald Dixon and all three men were bound over to Superior Court, under bond. The three men with Carter were charged with arson. The state charged the three men with the burning of the Frank Hughes home, near Stillson, this spring. The three men at the preliminary hearing entered a plea of guilty to the burning. They testified, however, that they were picked up in Savannah by Carter, brought to Stillson. One of the men brought gasoline and one of the men went to the Hughes home, where he saw Carter throw the gasoline on the porch of the house and set fire to the gasoline. Carter and the three men returned to Savannah. Several days later one of the men, Grady Lewis, was arrested and later the other two men were arrested. Carter could not be located. For many weeks Sheriff Mallard has been on the trail of Carter and a few days ago he was located in Dayton, Ohio. As soon as extradition papers could be secured, Sheriff Mallard and Solicitor Neville went for Carter and returned to Statesboro with their prisoner, Wednesday.
