STATESBORO MARKET SELLS MORE TOBACCO FOR MORE THAN 1936

FIGURES AS REVEALED BY THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE THIS WEEK. ALSO SHOWS GREATER INCREASE THAN OTHER TWO AND THREE WAREHOUSE MARKETS.

While other tobacco markets in Georgia were selling less tobacco for less money this season, the Statesboro market sold more tobacco for more money than 1936, figures revealed by the State Department of Agriculture show this week.

Statesboro sold 4,840,528 pounds this year against 3,629,528 for 1936, or an increase of 1,111,004 pounds. The other markets in Georgia, with two and three warehouses, in the same class with Statesboro, did not have the increase that Statesboro made this season. The smaller markets and their sales for the two years ago: Baxley, over a million pounds less than 1936; Haskins, 335,000 pounds less; Habers, 231,000 pounds less; Metter, 757,000 more; Nashville, 529,000 pounds less; Pelham, 174,880 pounds more; Waycross, one half million less. The big markets also sold less tobacco than they did in 1936, with the exception of Valdosta, which sold one and a half million pounds more. Blackshear was about the same as last summer, Douglas sold 22 million pounds less, Moultrie sold about a million pounds less, Tifton over a million pounds less, and Vidalia sold about the same.

Two Dead In Auto Wreck on Route 80

SERIES OF WRECKS OVER WEEK END RESULT FROM WET AND SLIPPERY ROADS AND RAINS - WRECKERS KEPT BUSY.

Route Eighty, which traverses Bulloch county for more than thirty miles, has been the scene of a large number of automobile wrecks within the past few days, including one wreck in which two women were killed and four others were injured.

Saturday afternoon and Sunday morning wreckers were busy bringing wrecked automobiles into the Statesboro Hospital. The Statesboro County Hospital was crowded with wreck victims.

Mrs. J. M. Bernheim and her sister-in-law, Miss Louise Bachelor, of St. Augustine, Florida, were killed in a wreck Sunday afternoon at Stillson, when the car driven by Mrs. Bernheim collided with a car driven by Joe D. Weed of Savannah. Mrs. Bernheim was killed instantly and Miss Bachelor died within a few minutes after being brought to a local hospital. Mr. Bernheim was badly cut and lacerated about the head and body and it is understood that he will not be permitted to leave the hospital for several days. Weed, driver of one of the cars, was also cut and bruised about the head but was dismissed from the hospital Monday. In the car with Weed were Miss Florence Tison of Savannah and her grandmother, Mrs. A. L. Stubbs. Miss Tison has also been dismissed from the hospital. Mrs. Stubbs was badly lacerated and will remain in the hospital for several days.

Teachers College Get New Buildings and Water Works

ALONG WITH REPAIR WORK ON THE DORMITORIES; INCLUDED IN NEW ALLOTMENT OF P. W. A. THROUGH BOARD OF REGENTS.

Along with the announcement from Washington that the South Georgia Teachers College would get three new buildings and a new water works system, came the announcement from President Marvin S. Pittman of the college that the college were being modeled and repair work was being done on a third.

In the new allotment of the P. W. A. through the Board of Regents of the University System, the Teachers College will get a new library, a new girls dormitory, a new training school, and a water works system.

Laboratories will be installed in all rooms which do not have laboratories at present and a pressing room and kitchenette will be added on the first floor. The lobby, which was recently remodeled, with two commodious and attractive living rooms, will be rearranged in keeping with the first floor changes.

COUNTY SCHOOLS TO OPEN FRIDAY SEPT. 10 WITH 127 TEACHERS

COUNTY SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT H. P. WOMACK STATES COUNTY SCHOOLS TO FARE WELL UNDER NEW PUBLIC SCHOOL SYSTEM.

The Bulloch county schools will open for the fall term, Friday, September 10. H. P. Womack, county school superintendent announced here Thursday.

The county schools will open this year with bright prospects since the recent reorganization of the public school system in Georgia. The county schools, according to Superintendent Womack will fare well under the new set-up. Last year the county school system employed 116 teachers, this year 127 teachers have been allotted to Bulloch county. Free school books will be furnished every student from the first grade through the high school. Many of the books have been received and all are expected to be on hand by the opening date.

Thirteen schools, including the Ogeechee Laboratory School, will be operated in Bulloch this year. The Milton school has been discontinued and students from that community will be sent to the Portal and Middle-ground consolidated schools. The Ogeechee Laboratory School will again be operated by the South Georgia Teachers College as a training school.

Superintendent Womack stated that Miss Jane Franseth will again be county supervisor for the Bulloch schools, working in cooperation with the teachers college.

The schools and their superintendents in the county system that will open next week are: Brooklet, J. H. Griffith (15 teachers); Cliftonville, Miss Abby Ivy, (2 teachers); Denmark, M. B. Brown, (4 teachers); Eula, J. C. Cate, (4 teachers); Lee-field, L. B. Boykin, (5 teachers); Middle-ground, Ernest Anderson, (6 teachers); Nevis, H. H. Britt, (16 teachers); Portal, H. G. McKee, (60 teachers); Register, O. E. Gray, (13 teachers); Stillson, S. A. Driggers, (11 teachers); Warnock, Wm. S. McElveen, (6 teachers); West Side, W. Louis Ellis, (9 teachers). The number of teachers for the various schools are subject to change and in some instances other teachers may be added. From the Superintendent's office it was learned that the entire faculty for the county schools is complete with a few exceptions.

Superintendent Womack also stated that opening conditions may delay the operation in one or two schools but September 10 has been set as the regular opening date for all the schools.

Of interest to the people of this county is the fact that the Portal Consolidated school is one of, if not the largest consolidated school in Georgia. Portal has above 20 teachers and an enrollment of approximately 600 students. The Portal school district covers a large territory.
