Selling of Timber In Lump Sum Often Is Not Profitable

COUNTY AGENT SHOWS HOW IMPORTANT TO KNOW HOW MUCH TIMBER IN CERTAIN TRACT BEFORE MAKING A TRADE TO SELL.

County Agent Byron Dyer today warned farmers against selling their timber in a lump sum as full value often is not received in a deal of this kind.

"You wouldn't sell a herd of cattle without counting them," the agent asserted. "Well, it's just as important to know how much timber you have in a certain tract and what its market value is, before making a trade to dispose of it."

Mr. Dyer offered two suggestions to owners of timber land or farm woodlands who have timber or pulpwood to sell:

(1) Get a reliable estimate on the cords of pulpwood, the number of poles or posts, or the board feet of saw-timber that is to be sold.

(2) Find out the value of wood products being sold. The sale is likely to be made blindfold, unless estimates are made of the number of cords of wood or the number of units of other products to be sold.

The agent called attention to recent studies, made by the United States Forest Service, which showed that it takes nearly twice as long to cut a cord of wood from 6-inch trees as from 12-inch trees; and it requires five times as many 5-inch sticks as it does 12-inch sticks to make one standard cord.

He pointed out that 42 trees, with a diameter of 4 inches, are required to make a cord, but that it takes only 22 six-inch trees, 14 seven-inch trees, 10 eight-inch trees, 7 nine-inch trees, or 6 ten-inch trees for a cord.

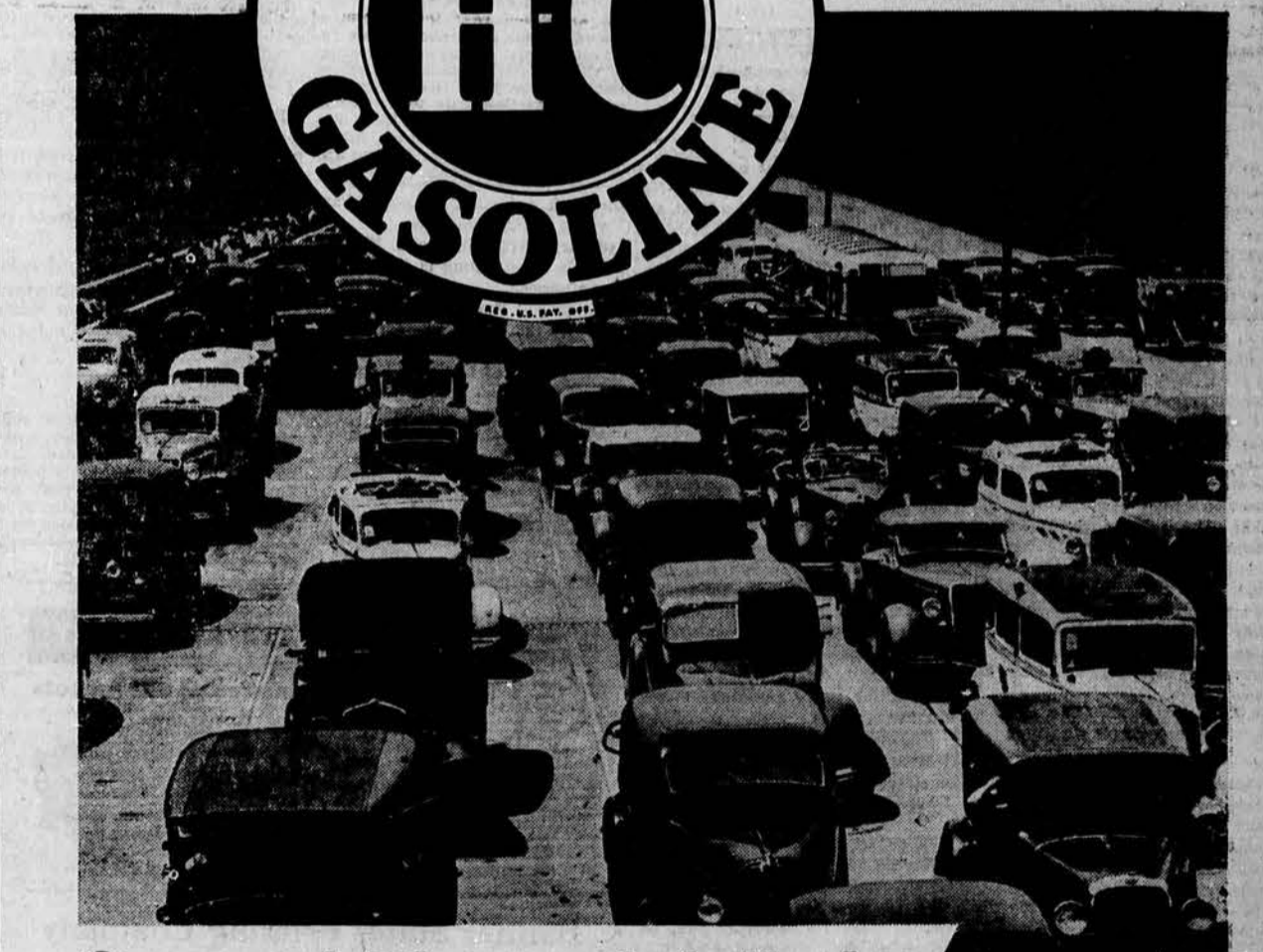
