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Blue Devils Turn Sylvania Game Into Track Meet To Score 47 Points

Displaying tremendous power and bullet-like speed the Statesboro Blue Devils gave the 1200 people that were at the game last Friday night proof that they still have one of the best teams in the district and that if they can get those tough Millen boys back over here in their backyard they will do the same thing to them that they did to the Sylvania boys Friday night. The Sylvania boys were doped to beat the Blue Devils at least one touch-down, but the boys in blue upset the bucket and trampled the Sylvania team by the lopsided score of 47-6.

Sylvania started out as though they were going to kick the home boys by scoring in the opening minutes of the play. Bell made enough yardage in four plays to account for the first two downs. Mobley then dropped back and passed to Brandt who ran the remaining five yards to score. The try for extra point failed. The Statesboro boys seemed to have been caught napping. But six points took them up and on the kick-off Gene Hodges took the ball on the thirty-five yard line and behind perfect interference ran sixty-five yards to score. The extra point failed. After this the Blue Shirts had all the fun.

In the second period they completed three drives that netted three touch-downs and two extra points. Robert Hodges, Skeet Kennon and Davis Barnes doing most of the ground gaining. The second line came after a twenty yard run by Robert Hodges, fifteen yards by Kennon and Barnes bucking it over. Barnes made the extra point also. The third came after a fifteen yard run by Hodges and a nice thirty yard sprint by Cone which carried the ball over. Barnes again bucked the line for the extra point. The fourth came after Kennon sliced off fifteen yards around end and successive line gains by Cone and Barnes. Barnes finally bucked through the center of the line for the score.

In the third quarter the Blue Shirts scored once, Barnes scoring after Hodges made several gains to put the ball in scoring territory. In the final period two more touch-downs were made one resulting from a beautiful run of six yards by Robert Hodges, who took the ball on his own goal line and ripped off sixty yards. Barnes scored after this run and Hodges scored again. The final score being 47-6 in favor of the underdog, Statesboro High.

U.S. Cotton Report Indicates Largest Crop In History

OFFICIAL ESTIMATE PLACES THE 1937 COTTON CROP AT 18,243,000 BALES, 670,000 MORE THAN THE OCTOBER ESTIMATE. Government estimators, on November 6, estimated the 1937 cotton crop at 18,243,000 bales, which if realized, will be 265,000 bales more than the previous largest crop of 17,978,000 bales in 1926. The new estimate was 670,000 more than the indicated production one month ago.

This official forecast will add to the difficulties of government leaders attempting to shape a new farm program for the special session of Congress which meets this month. The crop report also estimated the average yield per acre at 288.8 pounds for the entire cotton belt. This tops all previous yields. This year's crop is being produced on 33,736,000 acres of land.

Abandonment of acreage this year was much less than average and favorable weather and other conditions combined to boost the production estimate each month after the first official forecast in August. It is rather interesting to note that the 1937 cotton crop in China is not expected to exceed 4,000,000 bales, compared with earlier estimates of 4,200,000 bales. This crop estimate of 4,000,000 will be an all time record for China. Planting was increased from 10 to 15 per cent this year. The Turkish cotton crop this year is likely to establish a new high record by exceeding 250,000 bales, according to the Cotton and Cotton Oil Press.

Military operations in the Shanghai territory have destroyed many cotton fields, in addition to damage done to the crop by heavy rains.

Allow 20 minutes to each pound. If turkey browns too fast, cover with butter paper to prevent burning.

Peanut or Pecan Stuffing 3 cups bread crumbs, 1/2 cup chopped Georgia peanuts or pecans, 1/2 teaspoon onion juice, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 1 tablespoon chopped parsley, 2 tablespoons butter, 1/4 cup stock or water, 1 teaspoon salt.

Mix bread crumbs and crushed nuts. Add onion juice, salt, pepper, and parsley. Moisten with butter and stock or water. Mix thoroughly and stuff turkey.

Giblet Gravy Pour off the fat from the pan in which the poultry has been roasted, leaving 4 tablespoons. Add 3 tablespoons flour and stir until it is brown. Measure water in which giblets were cooked. Add enough water to make 3 cups. Add to the brown flour and stir until smooth and thickened.

Shred a small white cabbage, and plunge a handful at a time into the salted boiling water. As soon as it boils up once drain and serve with a white sauce made of one tablespoon of butter, one tablespoon flour, and a cup of milk.

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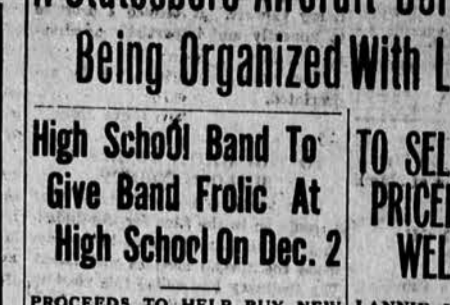
