## Georgia Farm Income Likely Less In 1938

Georgia farmers were advised this week by the annual outlook report of the Agricultural Extension Service prices obtained in 1937.

Particular attention is called to the fact that the Congress is now considering the passage of legislation designed to be helpful to producers of cotton, tobacco and other major commodities.

"What the nature of this legislation will be, cannot be foreseen," the report said. "Presumably, the new legislation will be designed to support the Soil Conservation and Domestic Allotment Act, under which the Agricultural Conservation Program is now operating.

"In the event," the outlook continued, "the cotton farmers should become familiar with the factors underlying the present cotton situation, and should give serious thought to what our future cotton policy should be in order to restore cotton to purchasing power parity."

It will be to the interest of Georgia tobacco growers to consider carefully the benefits to be derived from participation in the Agricultural Conservation Program, and to pitch their crops on the basis set up in this program. Georgia tobacco growers should also familiarize themselves with the methods of combatting blue mold infection which are now available."

The outlook for virtually all livestock in 1938 make a special effort to produce an adequate supply of food and feed for home use.

Director Walter S. Brown, of the Extension Service, said the information contained in the report is "of-fered in an attempt to present facts which may be helpful to Georgia farmers in making their plans for 1938."

"Adjustments in state and national agricultural policies have been rapid in recent years," Director Brown said. "These adjustments have been made possible by the co-operation of individual farmers. It is important that Georgia farmers know the facts that make these adjustments necessary.

With this knowledge, Georgia farmers are in a position to make intelligent adjustments in their own farms. These local, individual adjustments by Georgia farmers contribute directly to the formulation of sound state and national agricultural policies."

The report, after noting that the world supply of cotton for the 1937-38 season is expected to be the largest in history, concludes that "American cotton producers will be faced in 1938 with the most serious situation with respect to the supply and demand for cotton that has existed since 1932."

"In view of this fact," the report said, "every reasonable effort should be made by Georgia farmers to pitch the 1938 crop on a basis which will result in the largest net returns to growers.

"Present indications are that a crop of between 10 and 12 million bales will result in largest returns. A crop of this size would avoid adding to the price-depressing surplus which already exists, and would be sufficient to prevent any further loss in the competitive position of American cotton in foreign markets."

The outlook said that present prospects "indicate that a reduction in the acreage of flue-cured tobacco of about 10 per cent in 1938 from the harvested acreage in 1937, will be necessary to maintain the present price level."



#### LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor:  
There came to my attention recently a copy of your paper in which there is an editorial regarding 4-H Club work. I wish to thank you for the most splendid editorial. It is one of the very best that I have seen on the subject. You will be interested to know that in Georgia we have nearly 65,000 4-H Club members, and I am glad to say that in Bulloch county there is one of the best memberships of any county in the state, and the accomplishments of 4-H Club work in that county have been most inspiring.

You will be further interested to know what 4-H Club members do. In 1936 they produced products valued at \$1,813,096.57. One thing that impresses me very greatly with reference to 4-H Club work is that it gives equal opportunity to boys and girls, whether rich or poor. This is demonstrated and proven by the fact that the only time the national trophy for outstanding leadership in the United States was brought to Georgia was by Nelle Appling, a Fulton county 4-H Club girl, the daughter of a widow who was on relief. And everywhere all over the state, we have first prize winners in 4-H Club work coming from the ranks of tenant farmer boys and girls in about the same ratio as the population of this group bears to the whole number of farm boys and girls.

You, of course, know of the records of the individual club members in Bulloch county even better than I do, and no doubt the splendid work of young people here has been a great inspiration to the 4-H Club work.
