The copper oxide-cottonseed oil the agent declared. He warned, how-ever, that a late start reduces the margin of safety, and may lead to complete failure, if general blue mold infection hits the bed before the spray schedule is begun.

In the past, blue mold has been appearing in the state about February 5 to 15, Mr. Dyer advised. It is necessary, he said, to begin spraying before the blue mold appears in the bed. As soon as the grower receives word that the disease has appeared in the state, he should apply the first spray and repeat it twice a week until time to transplant.

"Sprayed beds frequently suffer light attacks of blue mold," the agent asserted, "but the plants are seldom more than slightly injured. If the spraying is begun early enough, the plants recover, and once they have recovered, it is not necessary to con-

MEMBERS OF COUNCIL ON HIS PLANS OF HEALTH UNIT UN-DER ELLIS HEALTH LAW

In a grief forceful talk to the nembers of the Bulloch county Child ealth and Welfare Council, Tuesday night Dr. H. E. McTyre, outlined some of his plans for the county as health officer under the recently a dopted Ellis Health Law.

'For the success of Bulloch's health program under the new health unit it will be necessary to start with the adult," stated Dr. McTyre. "Our big job is to make the people in the county public health conscious. Having done this our object then is to attempt to have every child examined beginning at the age of six months, periodically until they become of high

Dr. McTyre stated that if they are able to check each child three years after the first examination at six months they will be able to note any change in the child's health and


