By voting to legalize whiskey in the 16 counties the house of representatives has declared that it no longer wants to see liquor go untaxed by the state. Whiskey is one of the few commodities that is not taxed already, and had the house failed to pass this measure it would have amounted to a compromise with the "bootleggers."

Georgia's legislature did not vote repeal, they voted and passed a measure to produce revenue and control a liquor traffic that was and is flooding the country and the state. Tis measure will give the counties which wish to remain dry the first real opportunity they have had to stop, with the aid of the state, the flow of bootleg liquor into their own

The Thomas liquor legalization bill as passed by the house would legalize sale on liqcor in the following counties:

Bibb ((Macon); Brantley (Nahunta); Bryan (Pembroke); Bulloch (Statesboro); Chatham (Savannah); Coffee (Douglas); Dougherty (Albany); Evans (Claxton); Fulton (Atlanta); Glynn (Brunswick); Lowndes (Valdosta); McIntosh (Darien); Muscogee (Columbes); Richmond (Augusta); Ware (Waycross); Wayne (Jesup).

In addition to the legalizing liquor in the specified counties, the measure contains a provision limiting the state ad valorem tax on property to three mills, permitting the county to add two mills to its levy for general purposes, in addition to other taxes. The state levy is now five mills-the constitution-

The bill would set up a system of state supervised warehocses form which wholesalers must buy. It prevents sales on election days or Sunday, prohibits women from working in retail store capacities and allows sales onl yin unbroken packages which cannot be consumed on the premises. It fixes the warehouse license at \$1,000, the wholesaler's license at \$500 and the retail dealer's license at \$250.00 for the state. It carries the provision that the county and city licenses cannot exceed those fixed for the state. This means that a great number of those selling liquor now will be forced out of the besiness, leaving only a few who will be able to pay the licenses as fixed, thus bringing about a direct and far-reaching contribution to the cause of true temperance, in that it would make possible real control of the liquor traffic, not only in the counties where sales would be legalized, but more importantly in the counties which would, if they could, keep liquor entirely outside their boundaries.

We cannot give too much praise to the members of the lower house of the assembly for their action in the cause of law and order and of true temperance. We wish to praise Hon. Prince H. Preston and Hon. A. M. Deal for their courageous fight and vote last week for taxing and controlling whiskey, a commodity that should have long ago been "KNOW THE TRUTH-SAVE OUR YOUTH"

There was a time when the mere mention of the words was sufficient to mark a person. But we are becoming aware of the necessity of light upon the subject.

During the last few years many thousands of words have been written, many talks have been made and lectures given, in regard to the control of syphilis and gonorrhea, The tremendous amount of venereal infection existing amoung our people must be known at the present time to nearly every reader of almost any kind of literature.

In a survey now being made by Dr. H. E. McTyre, of the Ellis Health Unit, here in Bulloch county, he has learned that more than 400 deaths in the county have been attributed to heart disease in the last five years. He venteured to add that of these 400 deaths approximately one-half actually died of syphilis. Because of the incompleteness of the vital statistics as have been kept in Bulloch county it becomes hard to say just to what extent these diseases do exist.

A great deal of money is being spent to provide treatment for those inflicted with these disease, not only by individuals, but by civic groups, counties, and states. This is all well and good, but treatment alone will not eradicate the veneral diseases. Action of a more fundamental nature is vitally neces-

Education is the thing. Our young people ust be brought to the realization that they themselves have much to do with the proproblem and its solution. To this end, they must be tacght the facts about the danger and prevalence of syphilis and gonorrhea.

On February 2 the American Social Hygiene Association will sponsor a National Social Hygiene Day. The purpose is to enlist the public in the fight being waged against these diseases, especially syphilis. Public meetings will be held, instructive lectures given and other publicity measures carried

With the Ellis Health unit now functioning in the county it is possible, with the cooperation of all, to completely stamp out this great menace that is now upon the country.
