Relentless war on all forces that are causing destruction to Georgia's forests is necessary, not only for the protection of the timber and its by-products, but because the destruction reaches beyond the timber to other major industries which are dependent on the forest areas for their existence. Much has been said about the forests as allies in the conservation of soil. Thirty years ago Theodore Roosevelt said, "When the topsoil is gone, men must go; and the process does not take long." Georgia already has too much hard-pan area, unfit for cultivation, bearing testimony to the truth of this statement. The forests must be protected from the axe upon which a major portion of Georgia's population is dependent, is to be saved from destruction. There is still another industry, dependent almost entirely upon the forests for its existence. This is the industry of the fur and its by-products, wild game and animals. It is estimated that there are thirteen million sportmen in the United States, each spending on an average of \$50.00 annually or a total of \$650,000,000. This sounds like big business and it is. For sportsmen, the fur and its by-products, firearms, ammunition, fishing tackle, tents, motor boats, canoes and sports clothing. Equally detrimental to fish is the pollution of streams when they are burned or felled, clogging the streams and preventing the growth of plant life in the water upon which the fish depend largely for food. Touching vitally, as they do, so many phases of economic life, the forests and their protection should be a subject for earnest concern on the part of the business man everywhere.
