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
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
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

Friendship But ...

President Franklin D. Roosevelt, whom we all respect and admire, is bent on weeding out of councils the Democratic party all "Yes But . ." representatives in congress.

He took that unmistakable position in his vicious attack last week on that venerable gentleman, Senator Walter F. George of Georgia, who he called, "my old friend."

He emphasized that George was his friend and avowed his friendship not once, not twice, but several times.

But the president then launched the most vitrolic attack, which ever passed the lips of a president in any campaign-much less one in which he could have but one interest-the designation of a "Yes Man" for the Roosevelt policies.

Maybe we have no conception of what friendship is composed. Perhaps we cannot speak f r the deep south and its traditional love for friends and its almost fetish loyalty to those whom we call our friends.

It may be that the south and Georgia in particular have discarded those high concepts and are ready to accept Mr. Roosevelt's definition of what friendship has degenerated into under his attempt to dictate all national legislation.

As the President called George "my friend," he held high the executioner's knife. When he had slashed Georgia's senior senator, he again pledged his friendship but ruthlessly sunk his stiletto into George time and time again.

It was cruel. It was premediated. It was against every conception of a Georgian's idea of friendship and Georgians generally will resent it. They didn't like the reenactment of Caesar's slaying.

Georgians believe that friends stand by whether one is right or wrong. That was our conception of friendship in the deep south and especially in GEORGIA before we got a new definition from the President.

Mr. Roosevelt made it plain that he wants only "YES" men in the national congress. He wants men not to represent Georgia, but is asking for men who will do his bidding regardless or how it affects our state or any other state. He wants to eliminate all "Yes But" men not only from the New Deal and the Brain Trusters, but also from the official ranks of the Democratic party.

If Georgians want that, they know how to get it. They can vote for Lawrence Camp, self-styled, 100 percent Roosevelt "Yes Man," even though the President is not a citizen and cannot vote for him. If not, they know how to keep a man who for 16 years has ably, courageously and staunchly voted his convictions in the interests of the state

Regardless of how we vote, or what Georgia does, we believe Georgians generally will resent the "Friendship But . ." attitude assumed by the president in his Barnesville dedication of the REA project, in which he was so concerned about his "friendship for George" that he forgot to pull the switch to give the patrons of the line lights and power which the project was to have provided. Bulloch county, we are convinced, means to vote for George. It would have voted for George if the President had not come. It will vote for

George now that he has come and gone. The "Friendship But . ." attitude of the President failed to impress seriously the voters of our

county or Georgia especially since it is known the President has never yet turned on that power on the REA project.
