HOW NORTH CAROLINA FEELS ON CROP CONTROL

With the North Carolina tobacco selling season well under way the tobacco growers are raising the same complaint against tobacco quota inequalities that the growers in Bulloch and other South Georgia tobacco growing counties raised.

Despite these complaints and rumblings of crticism of the 1938 marketing program North Carolina tobacco growers have been holding mass meetings in which they reaffirmer their confidence in the program and are voting their support if a control referendum is called for 1939. In eight rallies held in Eastern North Carolina, 7,500 growers adopted resolutions "to vote and work for entrol in the referendum for 1939 if a referendum should be declared necessary and called on December 15 and in the meantime to withhold criticism and condemnation that they should see has already contributed to a serious decrease in the price of tobacco, and appeal to all farmers to refrain from unwise and often unjust thoughtless and uninformed criticism of this process; to restrain and answer such criticism by neighbors and othcontrol in the referendum for 1939 if a refthe law, and its administration as experience reveals them, by word and action to give no aid, comfort or support to its opponents who seek to destroy it that they may prosper, as formerly, at the farmer's expense . . . that we favor and will work for such amendments to the law as will correct errors and nequalities that experience has revealed."

In editorial comment the Tobacco Grower, a weekly newspaper published at Wilson N. C., devoted exclusively to the interest of tobacco growers, has this to say about crop

"The big news of the tobacco week is the firm stand taken by the Farm Bureau of North Carolina against the dropping prices of tobacco on the markets. Its members have voted to stand by the Federal tobacco control program in the same overwhelming majerity with which they first voted it into ef-

The Bureau has taken action and is proceeding on the hypothesis that the present slump in tobacco prices is due to rapidly spreading rumors that farmers will not vote for the continuation of control next year. They base this hypothesis on alleged confidences imparted by tobacco buyers to the effect that they cannot pay well for tobacco this year with every reason to suppose that control will be lifted next year and abundant tobacco at lower prices will be available.

When the Bureau first announced its eight meetings to be held in the New Belt over this matter, we were given the impression that the object was to go into the causes of the slump in prices. However, when the meetings convened a cause seemed already to have been found--the let-up in control senti-

VOTE FOR THE BOND ISSUES TODAY

An election is being held today to decide whether or not Statesboro shall go forward in its program for the improvement of its water system, sewerage system, streets and sidewalks and the construction of a gymnasium for the use of the schools. If the proposed bond issues totaling fifty-five thousand dollars are passed, the city can procure about three times that amount in the form of Federal aid for such purposes.

It is agreed that all the projects specified in the bond issues are necessary to the growth of Statesboro, and will be imperative with in the next few years. By acting now to get available help from the national government, the city can save nearly two-thirds of the

There seems to be no opposition to the bond issues, but under the rules for a bond election, more than one-half of the registered qualified voters must vote and there must be a two-thirds of those votes in the affirmative to authorize the bonds. It is imperative, therefore that all Statesboro's registered qualified voters who are for the proposed bond issue cast their ballot today.
