It indicates the fine type of work being done by that class. The subject of the editorial is one which would lose much if we attempted to handle it, so we give it to you just as it was handed to us.

> AN EDITORIAL By John Smith,

(S. H. S. Journalism Class) WHY PARENTS SHOULD VISIT SCHOOL

Mental, emotional, social and moral adjustment of a child must remain to a certain extent imperfect, in even the best of cases, unless parents and the teachers work together for that adjustment. Of course there are cases where this adjustment is made largely by a fortunate environment for the child in his home where the parents or others have worked unconsciously in cooperation with a supposed plan of school. The cases, however that give both parent and teacher the greatest concern and anxiety is essential to the teacher's ability to successfully take her place in the life of the child for purpose of helping him take his place in the social group at that greatest of institutions the public school.

There is only one way other than the visit to the school by the parent for a superintendent or teacher to really get a line on the child's background and that is for the teacher to visit the home of the child. This plan, it is to be regretted, is often not possible. The visit of the parent gives the superintendent and the teacher the opportunity to interest the parent in the school and to gain the respect and confidence of the parent. To the child, especially the small child it gives the feeling that the school and his parents are not so far apart and foleign to each other. The child is invariably pleased to see his mother or dad among visitors being shown attention by his teacher. Most parents like to do things for the school to which their children go, but when they are not acquainted with the school and its inner workings, what they do, seems so abstract that they do not get nearly so much joy from the doing as when they feel that they do not get nearly so much joy from the doing as when they feel that they are serving personal friends. Classroom exhibits, school carnivals, class talks and many other activities that may be of great interest to the parents may be used by schools as a means of inducing parents to visit schools. It is natural for a parert to enjoy hearing his child explain something that he has done, some exhibit in a class room that has involved individual thought and work on the part of the

child. Parents have a great tendency to limit their visits tothe smaller children, 'that is the primary and grammar schools grades, but we wisk to impress upon the parents that there is no place in the whole school where a close association of parent and school could do more good than in the adolescent or junior high school. The problem of the dolescent today seems more difficult than at any time in the past. The complexity of social life today presents a real problem to the boy or girl who must make a successful adjustment in the social world. Parents some-

times find themselves almost as bewildered as their childen as to what are the wisest decisions. In almost any instance a visit to the school and an understanding between teacher and percents—that could insure a heart to heart talk would be of inestimable value to parent and child. The school of today is in many respects very different from schools of a score of years ago and it is only through visits of parents and cooperation of parents, through close association that the school can be successfully tied up with the life problems of children and so mean much to those children whose welfare belongs to home and school alike. We cannot aford to forget that the great central objective of our educational program is making good citizens for a democraft society, and unless teachers and parents can work in the closest cooperation and understanding friendship, the success of this objective can never be attained. Visits from parents enable superintendent and teachers to know each other and form friendships that mean an understanding of the child and his world in a way that can never be reached

by any other means. We hope that we may have the happiness of many visits from parents during the year. We certainly assure you that you are always




