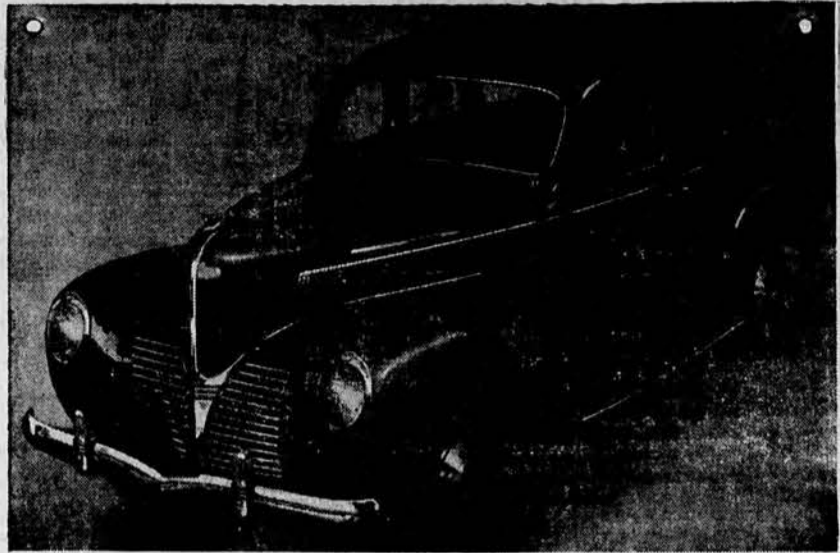
County Agent Says Legume Cover Crops For Orchards

COUNTY AGENT URGES WINTER LEGUME CROPS FOR ORCHARDS.

County Agent Byron Dyer, this last week urged Bulloch county farmers to use a good winter cover crop in their peach orchards this fall. He said Austrian winter peas and hairy vetch are the winter legumes likely to give best results as cover for peach orchards.

ers have been getting good results from the practice of winter cover cropping with legumes, followed by a summer clean-cultivated inter-crop such as cotton.

supplemental fertilization should be practiced, using a 4-8-6 commercial fertilizer which is an analyzing about 4 per cent nitrogen, 8 per cent phosphorus, and 6 per cent potash, at the rate of about one pound per inch of the tree's diameter.
