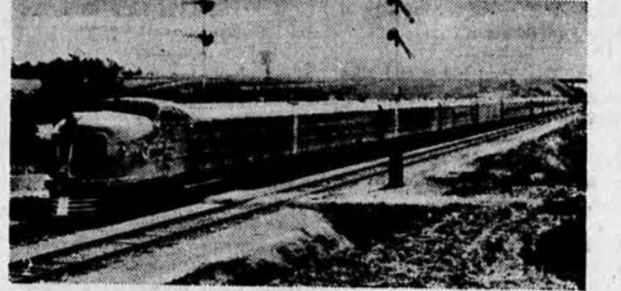

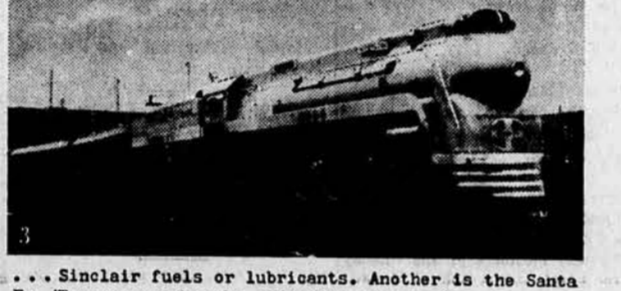

Dr. R.L. Cone Elected Mayor; Lannie Simmons and Dr. Hook Councilmen

Furnishing Statesboro with one of its most surprising political finishes, Saturday, Lannie F. Simmons, who was in his first political race, led the ticket in the race for two city council seats.

Dr. R. L. Cone, who has been a member of the city council for a number of years led the mayor's race to be elected with a total of 314 votes.

BULLOCH COUNTY TO GET 3,573 ACRES TOBACCO FOR 1939

With Average Yield of 893 Pounds Per Acre Bulloch tobacco growers will be allotted 3,573 acres with an average yield of 893 pounds per acre for '39.

Under the AAA program in 1934 these tobacco growers were allotted a total of 194 acres with an average yield of 795 pounds per acre.
