

Christmas is returning to remind the world that simplicity points the way to happiness.

Because the season glorifies the innocence of childhood, the most radiant thing on the earth, this message is easily delivered. We all know it takes little to gladden a childa cheap toy, a kind word.

But this message of simplicity also is easily misunderstood. This is because most the grown-ups feel it is a dream of fancy that cannot be. Some repeat with deep longing Elizabeth Aker Allen's wistful appeal, Backward, turn backward, O time, in your flight! Make me a child again just for to-'night!"

They are voicing sentimentality when they should be grasping sentiment.

Children are made happy by toys because they are attractive and can be treated any way. The cheaper ones thrill them just as the more expensive, for they have no sense of money values.

So a grown-up who would like to call back the past and wait again for Santa Claus does so because he wants to find escape.

We are saying this happiness is not wishful thinking, and that it can be found through an understanding of simplicity.

A grown-up seeing a child cry over a broken toy knows the child is shedding foolish tears. When a child a fretful because he is tired of an old plaything, the grown-up understands the trivality of his unrest. He suggests the simple remedy of getting another toy.

If he could liken the child's disturbances to his own life he would see that most of his worries are over things as small as broken toys-and that his illusions growing dim are as the child's disinterest in playthings he wants to throw away.

No, new toys would change to old ones and the stimulation they might bring would leave fresh hurt when the new had changed to

Led back to yesterdays by appreciation of a child at play, the man should not linger long in his own childhood. If only he would try he might not find it such a long, long way to the first Christmas. There he would see a Star-it was for faith-and hear a Songit was for hope. And he would learn that only the humble saw and heard. Then, perhaps, he would understand simplicity.
