BULLOCH COUNTY PRODUCED 494,274 DOZEN EGGS IN 1934

And 810,166 Gallons Of Milk Same Year

Georgia's farm per capita production of eggs showed a sharp drop in the five year period from 1929 to 1934, but milk production increased during the same period.

In 1929, the farmers produced 398,714 dozens of eggs for the 19,237 people on the farm, or an average of 37 of an egg a day per person.

Georgia's milk production was 14,193,191 gallons, or an average of 37 of a quart a day per person in 1929, and 15,045,267 gallons, or an average of 39 of a quart a day per person.

The survey was made by Kenneth Treanor, of Tifton, and J. William Fanning, of Athens, farm management specialist for the Georgia Agricultural Extension Service.

The specialist pointed out that the figures take into account all milk and eggs produced on farms, including that portion sold commercially or used for other purposes, such as churning of milk for butter and the use of eggs for hatching.
