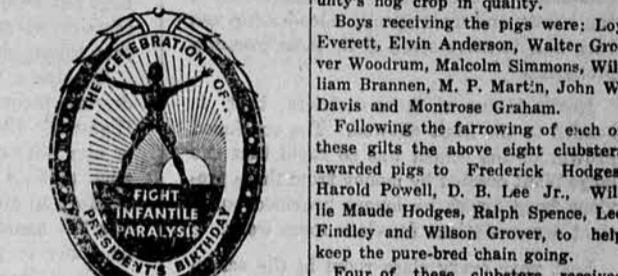
MISS MOSES TO PRESENT GRAMMAR SCHOOL PUPILS IN RECITAL
