"Cultural methods such as early planting, varieties of cotton grown, and proper fertilization and cultivation have marked influence on the control of the boll weevil."

Bulloch United Georgia Farmers Set Goal At 1000

100 NEW MEMBERS ADDED AT MEET HERE SATURDAY

Frank C. Ward, head field officer in Georgia of AAA, will be the speaker for the United Georgia Farmers meeting Saturday, June 17. Mr. Ward has been connected with the agricultural adjustment program in Georgia since 1933 in an administrative position.

Lockhart District Adds Livestock To Farm Program For Cash Income

Livestock as part of the farming program to add to the income has now made its way into every section of the county. The Lockhart section, where cotton alone has been the money crop, is now definitely in position to call hogs and cattle as much a part of its cash crop as cotton is today.

Several farmers in that section have been pioneers in this movement. White-faced cattle and large herd of hogs have been seen around Riley Finch's for several years. David Finch, Marlee Parish, Frank and Thurmond Sanders, Ted Vickery and a few others have made hogs help run the financial side of farming for several years.

John F. Nixon used to raise enough hogs for meat purposes but now he has around 100 head of hogs. Mrs. C. L. Finch at one time thought 10 or 12 hogs would supply her needs, but now she has 50 or 60 head. Oliver Finch must have 100 head of cattle. F. G. Ramsey has been on the livestock side for some time but now the white-faced cattle and more than 100 hogs make him a leader in this field. G. A. Beasley thinks of cotton as one 120 head of hogs as his cash crop for 1939. Ben A. Hendrix has moved up from a few good hogs to 50 head with a purebred sire to make them of a quality that sells early.

Tobacco is making its way into this one time, all cotton community. When the weed has gained enough footing and the livestock permanently established the one crop system of cotton farming will have moved from every section of the county.

War On Boll Weevil Declared In Bulloch

A passer-by often thinks the "war" is really on in some Bulloch county cotton fields late in the afternoon and early mornings. The white, silvery smoke screens seen gives ample evidence to these thoughts.

The "war" is really on, but on the boll weevil. The small two-row duster or sprayer is the most common machine being used by these cotton farmers.

War On Boll Weevil Declared In Bulloch. A passer-by often thinks the "war" is really on in some Bulloch county cotton fields late in the afternoon and early mornings. The white, silvery smoke screens seen gives ample evidence to these thoughts.

The tractor is used primarily as a motive power for the modern boll weevil "war". A small gasoline engine develops the power necessary to pull the fans.

The heavier implements of boll weevil fighting following the small machinery method, commonly known as mopping, employed prior to the time the cotton began to square up. Most of the fields that have mopped once or twice with the calcium arsenate and molasses mixture early are now being dusted or sprayed.

When the some 500 miles of "silver ribbons of life" tied more than 2,000 Bulloch county homes together some of the illusions man lives by became a reality. Since 1933 these farmers have lived by the illusion that a time would come when electricity would light their homes, add some necessities of life they could not have without electric current, and give them something that could be used to add to their income.

A farmer lives alone, building up illusions all around him—illusions about his friends, his ideals. When these are shattered, he is completely disillusioned and he goes about starting all over again. The cooperative results of these up and downs are no longer an illusion, but a reality. They joined hands with their neighbors from the Excelsior, from Denmark to Bilch, and put a Rural Electrification project into every section of the county where it was desired.
