

There Is A Law.....

Any violating said ordinance shall be fined in a sum not exceeding fifty dollars, or imprisonment n the county jail thirty days or thirty days at la-

ON AUGUST 21, 1903 an ordinance was passed reading "be it ordained by the Mayor and council of the town of Statesboro that no person shall play any game of ball or knock any balls on the streets of said town and the persons so doing shall be decmed guilty of disorderly conduct."

ON NOVEMBER 6, 1890 an ordinance was passed ding "be it ordained by the mayor and council of the town of Statesboro that it shall be unlawful for two or more persons to blockade the sidewalk so as to interfere with pedestrians travel and any such crowd, after being ordered by the marshall to disperse or move off the sidewalk and refusing to do so shall be deemed guilty of disorderly conduct."

It is carelessness of this sort that makes the fly A Sunday school picnic to Tybee was announced, havoc possible. There is no reason for anyone to olerate fly-breeding conditions, especially in congested areas. Even in rural sections adequate san itary protection, household screening, and fly-swatting will greatly neutralize the dangerous potential-

The fly must be recognized for what it is, de spite its innocent appearance and lack of sting. It will then be appreciated that no effort is too great to help destroy it. And this effort, when well directed, will not be so much against the fly itself as against its breeding places.

If typhoid deaths and infant morality from diarrheal conditions are to be reduced in Bulloch county this summer, and autumn, as well as eventual deaths from tuberculosis, now is the time to wage effective warfare against one of their most powerful agents—the deadly housefly.

APPENDICITIS CAUSES MANY DEATHS

During summer months, when the seasonal increase in intestinal disturbances takes place, appendicitis in children is often confused with "stomach ache" and in neglected cases serious consequence

Records show that appendicitis deaths increase in the summer, the highest number of fatalitie usually occuring in July and August. Last year, in Georgia, there were too many deaths from this cause reported with a high morality during the summer months due to neglect.

When children complain of abdominal pain or distress, appendicitis should be suspected since symptoms in young persons are often obscure. Appendicitis in children is frequently fatal which is often due to a "home-diagnosis" of "stomach-ache" and home treatment

All parents are advised against home prescribing of castor oil or salts because the use of these carthartics increases the possibility of a ruptured appendix when appendicitis is present.

In adults, the symptoms of appendicitis are usually characteristic, but in children symptoms frequently are not typical. Pain in younger persons, instead of being in the the right side where the appendix is located, may be present in any part of the abdomen. Fever may not be in proportion to the other signs of illness, and intestinal disturbances may be absent or greatly exaggerated. Acute appendicitis, especially when neglected, may follow a rapid course with early rupture and fatal results. On the other hand, with early recognition and proper care, the dangers of appendicitis are lessened to a remarkable degree.

So when intestinal disturbances occur do not consider them lightly and prescribe a laxatize such as castor oil and salts hoping that the "stomachache" will pass. The first thing to do is to call your family physician. Experience has shown that this procedure is the safest and most often prevents rupture and subsequent fatality.


