Mrs. Franklin was formerly Miss Margaret McArthur of McGreggor. The arriving guests were admitted at the back door and for the rest of the evening answered to Bowery names as given on their dance cards which featured beer bottles and dangerous disks. The interior of the Club Home was transformed into a cabaret of the Bowery type. Small tables placed against the walls had red and white checked covers, and flickering candles stuck in beer bottles furnished illumination. Four lamp posts at each corner of the club room gave additional light. Refreshments were dispensed from a counter across one end of the room.
