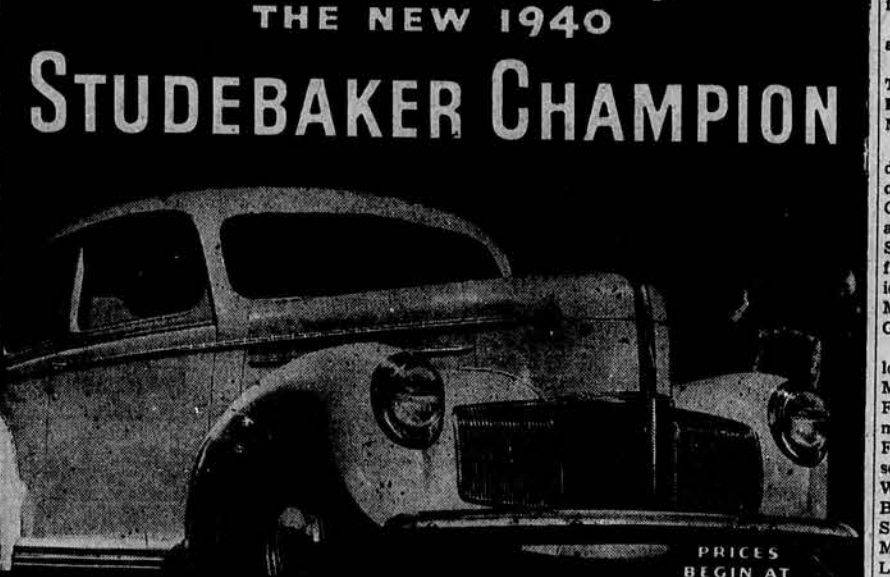

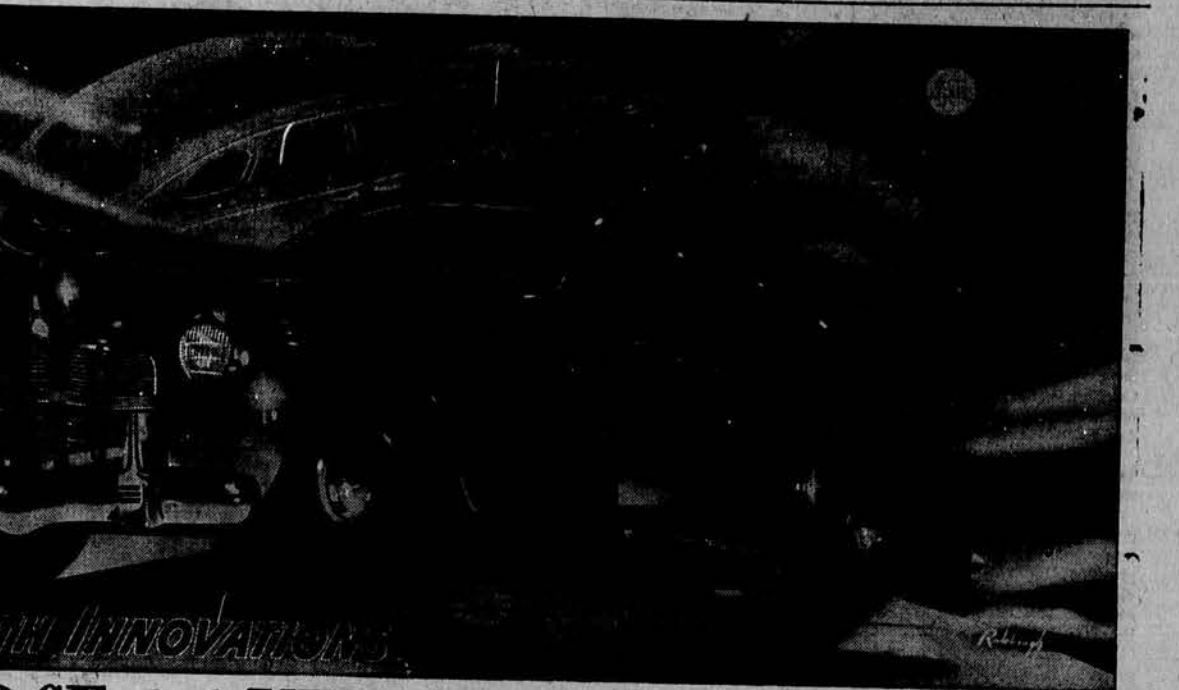

1940 AAA Farm Program Approved

Provisions of the 1940 A. A. A. Farm program have been approved and will be made known to Georgia farmers in plenty of time for them to plan cropping operations before planting time, County Agent Byron Dyer announced this week.

With The County Agent

The county agent explained that, according to a statement made by Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace, "through consideration was given to the present European situation and its possible effects on American agriculture when the 1940 program was drafted. The aim of this program is to maintain a production of farm commodities in this country which will balance with the demand, whatever that demand may prove to be, and to maintain and improve the fertility of our farms in effect this year and are based on farmer recommendations, the county agent said.

The provisions of the program dealing with agricultural conservation measures closely follow those in effect this year and are based on farmer recommendations, the county agent said. The wheat allotment of 62 million acres—7 million acres larger than the 1939 allotment—has already been announced, as have tentative wheat conservation and price adjustment payments which will total from 18 to 22 cents per bushel next year.

The county agent explained that changes in the 1940 program recognize special conditions in certain areas and emphasize soil conservation on all farms the county over.

An important provision which will encourage further soil conservation measures on small farms reserves that as much as \$20 may be earned on every farm participating in the program. Another important conservation provision will encourage the planting of forest trees on farms by allowing farmers to earn up to \$50 for tree planting, in addition to the regular soil-building allowance for the farm.

Soil-building practices have been provided to meet more adequately the needs for soil conservation, the county agent said, and special emphasis will be generally inadequate to extend the commercial peanut to a home-garden provision will be made available. The new provisions allow more counties than in 1939.

INCREASE IN SWINE PRODUCTION NEEDED ON GEORGIA FARMS

Georgia falls far short of producing its pork needs, despite the fact that she ranks ninth in the nation, being exceeded only by the seven Corn Belt states and Texas, Charles E. Bell, Jr., of Tifton, pointed out to Georgia hog raisers this week.

Bell, swine specialist for the Georgia Agricultural Extension Service, estimated the state could probably double the number of hogs produced. The number of hogs on Georgia farms this year has been placed at 1,554,000, with an estimated value of \$11,132,000, which is more than for any year since 1923, when the census showed a total of 1,600,000.

Due to favorable climate, soil, and wide variety of crops adopted to grazing and hogging off in the fields, the specialist stated that farmers, particularly those in the southern part of the state, have demonstrated that they can produce pork as cheaply as any section of the country. Even with low hog prices, they can successfully produce this increased number of hogs, provided full use is made of the advantages present for raising cheap pork, he further stated.

CLOSE-GROWING VEGETABLES

One of the outstanding developments on 18,000 in erosion-control demonstration areas of the Soil Conservation Service in the Southeast has been the use of close-growing vegetables for erosion control. R. Y. Bailey, chief of the regional agronomy division, tells us: "As a part of the erosion-control program on these farms, more than a half-million acres has

been planted to erosion-resisting crops and more than a million acres to semi-soil-resisting vegetation.

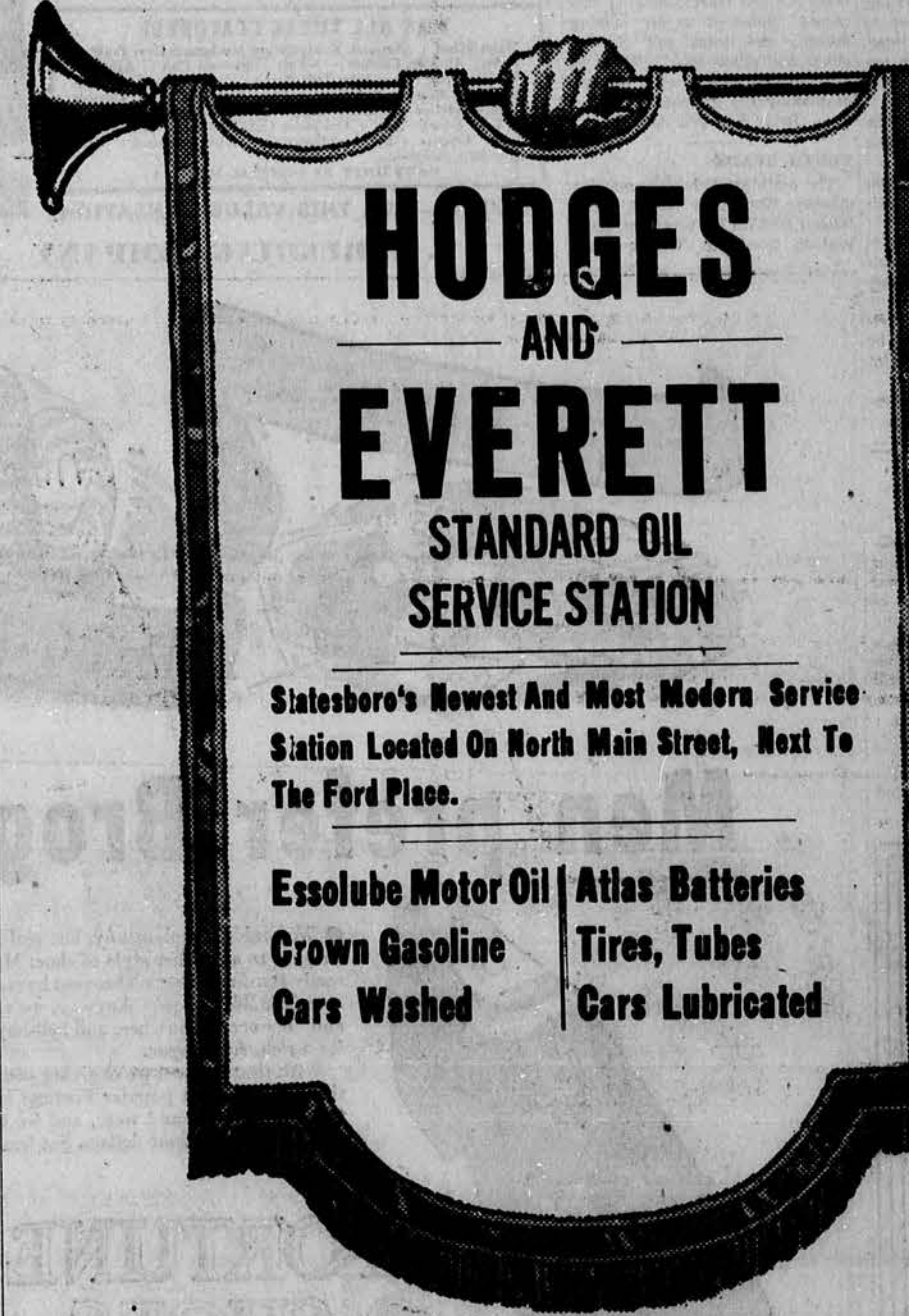

Delicious Dishes From The Georgia Sweet Potatoe

By Miss Elvie Maxwell Home Demonstration Agent Food Value The sweet potato is a nutritious, palatable, and universally liked food.

It is an excellent energy food. Its food value is somewhat higher than that of the white potato.

As compared with root vegetables, sweet potatoes rank high as a source of protein. They supply substances necessary for growth which are lacking in certain seed and grains.

As a source of mineral the sweet potato compares favorably with white potatoes and other root vegetables.

The sweet potato is base-forming. It may be substituted for bread rice or grits in any real meal to balance the acid-forming foods.

The vitamin content of sweet potatoes is an importance consideration in their food value.

They rank high as a source of vitamin A. Since vitamin A is associated with yellow coloring matter, the yellow varieties contain more of this vitamin than white varieties.

They are a good source of vitamin B, and contain appreciable amounts of vitamin C.

The sweet potato is valuable for every member of the family but, because of its excellent food value and ease of digestion when properly cooked, it is especially recommended for children.

Making a valuable contribution to the diet at small cost, the sweet potato is one of the most economical of foods. It may be served as a vegetable, as a desert and as a breakfast.

3. The object of their association is pecuniary gain and profit to its stockholders, and the general nature of the business or businesses to be transacted is as follows: to own and operate, or lease and operate, and print weekly and daily newspapers; to conduct a general job and commercial printing business, which shall include mimeographing, multigraphing and lithographing; to deal in printers' supplies; type, machinery, tables, cutters, etc., to stock and sell office equipment and supplies, typewriters, desks, paper; to make rubber and metallic stamps and stencils; to buy, sell, acquire, lease, hold own and deal in real estate; to make all contracts, and to do and transact all business connected with, incidental to, or collateral to the business or businesses hereinbefore enumerated.
