



# Let's Keep Our Primary **Out** Of State Politics

Mr D. B. Turner, editor of the Bulloch Times, one of South Georgia's better newspapers, carried a story on his front page, last week, pointing out the dangers envolved in holding our county primary on the same date as that of the state primary.

We heartly concur with The Times in the statement made in that story. It would seem unfair to our local candidates to embroil them in state and vational politics, in which anything might happen So far as we are able to learn our primaries have always been held early in the spring. They have been local affairs held in our own back yard, away from the hear of state primaries.

The Times story said:

"While some countics around this section are beginning to fix dates for their forthcoming primaries, and at least one of these dates has been fixed within the present year, little discussion has been heard of the matter in Bulloch county.

"However, the little discussion so far heard carries the suggestion that there might be a change in the custom of holding a ceparte primary-which is to say, that some are said to favor the holding of the county and state primary on the same date.

"So far as is known the discussions have not gone very far, and we are not informed as to the popularity of the suggestion, nor as to its significance, if any. Having said this much, we venture the further prediction that there will probably not be any change from the usual custom. There does appear to be any reason which would justify a change. In the past, the candidates for county offices-and they are the ones who have been called upon to defray the expense of holding the election-have demanded the right to be kept free from such entangling alliances as might arise from holding the state and county primary on the same date. Which means, those who seek county ofice demand to beprotected from state and nationl issues in the seeking of office.

"It is a recognized fact that state and national contests generate more heat than county elections. the heat from these might burn innocent candidates who do not have to be overshadowed and enmeshed in other person's candidacies.

"Whether that is a good or bad argument, we are not saying, but there is almost a certainty that no candidate or friend of any candidate for county ofice will be willing to get that candidate involved in a joint primary.

We are sure that we would be more able to select our county officers with more care and with a clearer mind if we keep state and national politics from muddying up our county primary.

# "Better Than A Three-Ring Circus"

The Bulloch Superior Court was in session for three days last week. The first day was given over to determinating what cases should be tried. Lawyers began argueing back and forth among themselves and with the Judge over minor points of law which could have been settled in minutes yet took the greater part of the day.

The second day was given over to the trying one case which had been in and out of court over a long period of time.

The third day was a repition of the first with the disputes among the lawyers more heated.

And it all cost money. More than fifty jurors were called at \$3.00 a day. These alone cost the county \$450. There is the Judge's salary, the special balliffs, and other costs. This does not include the time lost by the jurors who had to be away from their businesses for the period of three days.

It sounds reasonable to us. So when you see the riff and his bailffs know that he is not impolite but just "prepared for action." We thank Barney for the information.





# **Bulloch Farmers May Apply** For Price Adjustment Payment

Bulloch County farmers that cooperated with AAA program with cotton in 2939 may now sign their application for the price ad-justment payment, according to J. W. Gaskins, administrative assist-ant. Mr. Gaskins explains that this is the 16 cents on the cotton quota

ant. Mr. Gaskins explains that this is the 16 cents on the cotton quota mulpiled by the 1939 normal yield for the farm. Only about 15 farmers in the county have not cooperated with the cotton program, Mr. Gaskins says. Some farmers have cooper-ated on one farm by staying with-in the cotton quota but exceeded their quota on another farm. Since the subsidy payment is based on the individual farm cooperating it will be possible for these farm-ers to collect the 1.6 cents pay-ment on the farm they coopera-ted on for 1939. The 1939 work sheets are also being signed at the time the ap-pication is filled. However, it is not necessary for the share crop-pers to sign file work sheet. Mr Gaskins urges landlords to bring the share croppers that are inter-ested in cotton in 1939 with them so that the application may be completed without any delay.
