

THE LATE STAGE. The more common late effects of syphilis are fatal affections of the heart and blood vessels, blindness, deafness, and tumorlike growths which may destroy any of the tissues or organs of the body. Among the most serious effects are the attacks of the disease upon the brain and spinal cord. These bring various forms of mental derangement, convulsions, and paralysis, leading on to that almost hopeless condition, paresis, or general paralysis of the insane; or, if the spinal cord is mainly involved, progressive loss muscular contral (locomotor ataxia or tabes dorsalis) and loss of other important muscular functions. These later destructive changes of syphilis constitute the last stage of the disease.


