



COLD WEATHER

Dairy cows must be comfortable to do a good and economical job of producing milk, says Frank W. Fitch, Georgia Service dairyman. If they are unduly exposed to bad weather, or housed in cold, wet stalls, a large portion of their feed is used in keeping their bodies warm. This leaves a greatly reduced part of the ration for producing milk. 
