The potash deposit in California consists of a porous crystalline mass which is permeated by a dense alkaline brine. This brine is pumped out and put through a refinery which takes out impurities and turns out a pure, high-grade muriate of potash. The deposits in New Mexico are in the form of salt beds about a thousand feet below the surface of the ground. Potash salts in a pure state are similar in appearance to ordinary table salt, and, in fact, this is the principal impurity in the potash deposits. These salts are blasted loose and taken to the surface, where they are sent through a refinery. The product from these plants also is a very high grade of muriate of potash. Some of the raw salt is sold by the mines without refining, and this comes on the market as manure.




