TOBACCO COMMITTEE SEEKS BETTER LEAF



The Southern Tobacco Committee is regarded by growers of bright tobacco as the authority on fertilizer practices for this crop, and each year they look to it for recommendations. This committee, which is composed of representatives of the southern experiment stations, extension services, and the U. S. Department of Agriculture, meets annually to consider experimental results and study the plant-food requirements of tobacco.

For the 1940 season the tobacco committee recommends a fertilizer mixture containing 3% nitrogen, 10% available phosphoric acid, and 6% to 10% potash for the heavy or more productive soils, to be applied at the rate of 800 to 1,000 pounds per acre. For the light or less productive soils, 3% nitrogen, 8% available phosphoric acid, and 6% to 10% potash at the rate of 800 to 1,200 pounds per acre are recommended.


