LOCATION ch county is located in the southeastern part of the state, latitude 31 degrees-90 minutes, longitude 80 degrees-45 minutes, area 669 square miles, acreage 472,520; bounded by the counties of Effingham, Jenkins, Screven, Candler, Evans, and Bryan, Ogechee river forming its boundary

Statesboro, the county seat, is located near miles of Savannah, which is one of the leading ports of the South; eighty miles from Augusta

lloch was organized as a county in the year 1796, and was named for Governor Archibald Bulloch, an ancestor of former President Theodore Roosevelt and Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt.

The county has a mild climate; first frosts usually fall about Novmber 15th, and the last about March 15th; snow is very unusual. The average rainfall is about 48 inches each year. Very few days' work are lost on the farms du ing the year on account of cold weather. The forest and breezes from the sea, which makes the climate very healthful. During the summer nonths very few nights are so sultry as to interfere with one's rest, as the cool breeze rom the ocean and gulf sweep over this part of the state from the South, causing the night

The soils are principally of the Tifton pebbly series Norfolk loam and sandy loam, well adapte to the culture of cotton, tobacco, corn and peanuts, which constitute the main crops; suscept of cultivation within a very few hours after rainfall, which insures a great saving in cultivation. The lowlands are well adapted to the growth of pasturage grasses, forming a cheap feed for cattle raising, which, constitutes one of the chief pursuits of the people. These lowlands are well adapted to the growth of pine timbe which is very valuable for the production of naval stores and lumber, and with the modern processes of pine culture and preservation it is possible to produce turpentine and rosin from this timber within ten years of the germinating of the pine nasts or seed, or within nine years of setting

The people of this county are mainly of Irish, Scotch and English descent, with a small sprinkling of German origin. At the last census in 1930 two-thirds of whom are white. In comparatively recent years the county has contributed to the formation of other counties. 




