Words of Wisdom

The little I have seen of the world teaches me to look upon the errors of others in sorrow, not in anger. When I take the history of one poor heart that has sinned and suffered, and represent to myself the struggles and temptations it has passed through...

LET US BE PREPARED!

CALMLY AND with much the same manner as a seventh grade teacher in a geography class, but with a deadly inference, President Roosevelt described to our nation over radio last Thursday the problem now confronting us as a result of the deadly struggle going on in Europe.

With the World War II only nine months old we see Poland, Norway, Denmark, Holland, Luxembourg, Belgium, crushed and bleeding under the heels of a ruthless invader and England and France trying to brace themselves against the vast war machine of Germany whose strength is concentrated in a mighty air force.

So it is with no surprise that President Roosevelt asks for \$1,182,000,000 with which to build 50,000 military and naval planes, and a production capacity geared up to 50,000 planes a year; rapid increase in the output of equipment of all kinds, including motor transport and artillery, anti-aircraft guns, ammunition, and essential supplies of every sort.

In his speech he made it factually clear what air navigation, stepping up the speed of possible attack to 200 and 300 miles an hour, means to America's security.

From the fjords of Greenland it is four hours by air to Newfoundland; five hours to Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Quebec; and only six hours to New England. The Azores are only 2,000 miles from parts of our eastern seaboard; and if Bermuda fell into hostile hands, it is a matter of less than three hours for modern bombers to reach our shores.

From a base in the outer West Indies, the coast of Florida could be reached in 200 minutes. The islands off the west coast of Africa are only 1,500 miles from Brazil. Modern planes starting from the Cape Verde Islands could be over Brazil in seven hours. And Para, Brazil, is but four flying hours to Caracas, Venezuela; and Venezuela is but two and one-half hours to Cuba and the Canal Zone; and Cuba and the Canal Zone are two and a quarter hours to Tampico, Mexico; and St. Louis, Kansas City and Omaha.

We are for peace—we bend over backward for peace—we think that war is the most insane and futile of human activity but when a brutal force who would deprive us of our peace refuses to understand reason and justice then it is the time to impress them with an invulnerable defense. Such a defense is suggested by President Roosevelt.

When we know that people in London and Paris live under a constant burden of fear and panic and that the people of the low countries have suffered beyond mental comprehension, then we say give the President what he is asking. Let us be prepared for the worst the future may hold, at the same time holding to our faith in Him to whom we look in continued hope for peace and good will among men and nations.

Harvey Brannen has had a long and active career in Georgia politics and legislative work. He was recognized as a leader in the house of representatives while he served there and in the Senate of which he was a member at the time of his death.

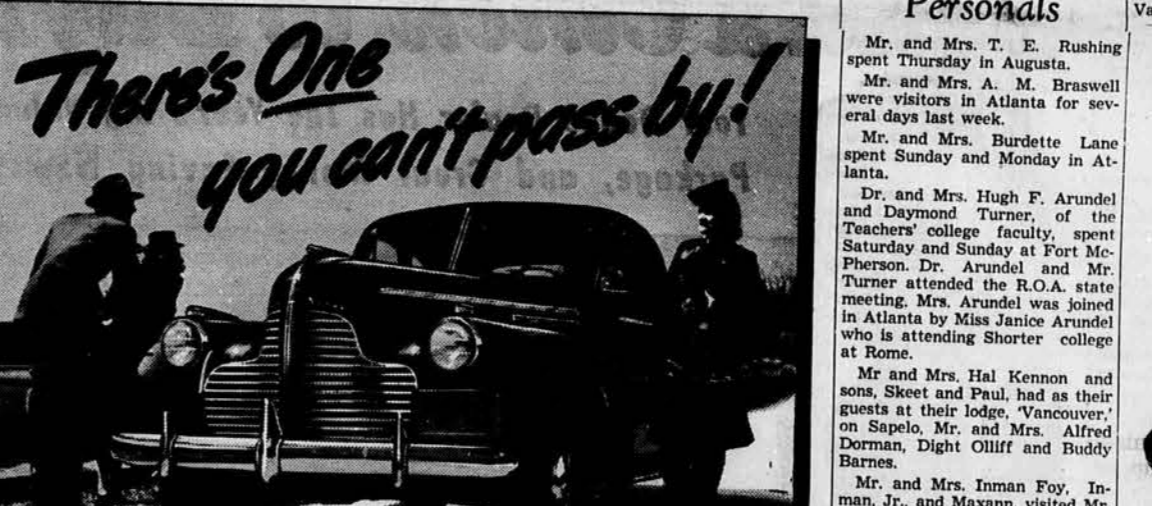

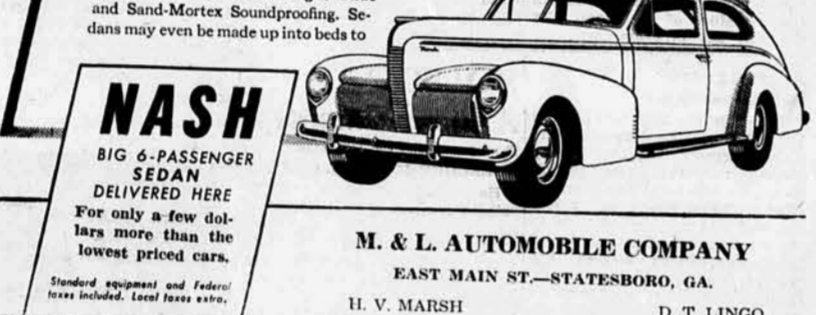
