ELLIS ARNALL

R. E. A. BUILDING

AT A MEETING of the board of directors of the Excelsior Rural Electric Membership Corporation held in Metter last week, directors representing only 28 per cent of the stockholders in the corporation voted to build, in Metter, an office building at a cost of approximately \$7,000.

An application for funds with which to build the building is now in Washington before the Administrator of the Rural Electric Administration. Along with this application there is a new project adding over 100 miles of REA lines in this section.

At the meeting held in Metter the directors representing 72 per cent of the stockholders in the corporation attempted to postpone action on the erection of a permanent building until the completion of the project. It develops that there is already a lease on the building they now use for an office which has over a year to run.

One of the elements that the directors representing only 28 per cent of the electric users overlooked in their action is their selection of a location for the office building, when the proper time for its construction comes. A public co-operative of this nature is built for the purpose of serving the greater number for the greater good.

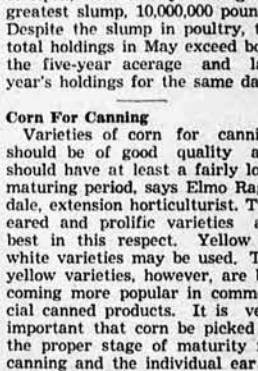

Bull Weevil Control Is Profitable For Cotton, Agent Says

Poisoning of cotton to control boll weevils was recommended this week by County Agent Byron Dyer as a profitable practice for Bulloch county farmers.

The boll weevil is recognized as one of the limiting factors in production of cotton in Georgia.

This mixture because of cheap cost can be used to advantage on severe damage later in the season if applied just prior to the time plants begin to square.

Mr. Dyer said investigations covering a period of years revealed that arsenic, arsenate dust or a molasses arsenic mixture is good insurance against weevils and may prevent severe damage later in the season if applied just prior to the time plants begin to square.

"Three applications of a mixture containing one part of arsenate, one gallon of water and one gallon of molasses has given the best pre-squaring control," the county agent pointed out.

"This mixture because of cheap cost can be used to advantage on severe damage later in the season if applied just prior to the time plants begin to square.

Mr. Dyer said the first application should be made just as the stalk bunches in the top and about six leaves, or when the first squares appear.

Need for further poisoning will depend on the degree of infestation and weather conditions, he added.

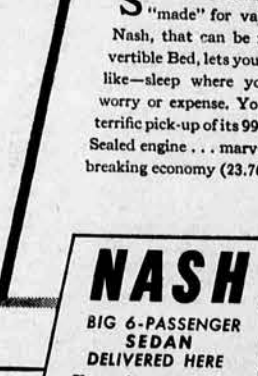

**HOME AGENT SAYS WATCH SHRINKAGE IN MEN'S SHIRTS**

When a man can't button his shirt with ease, he is probably washed, the chances are that who ever bought the shirt wasn't thinking about shrinkage, says Home Demonstration Agent Irma Spars.

"A poor-quality shirt is rarely preshrunk, and no allowance is made for shrinkage," she points out. "Therefore, the collar may be tight or the sleeves too short after it is laundered. Some of the poorest grade covert and chambray work shirts shrink as much as 10 per cent, in one direction.

"Shrinkage cannot be judged by looking at a shirt fabric," she continues. "You need to look for facts on labels. Many good- and medium-grade shirts have been submitted to a controlled shrinkage process. These shirts are usually cut a little larger than the stamped neck and sleeve size to allow for slight additional shrinkage, possibly 2 per cent. After laundering, the shirts are stamped as they are on the stamped size.

The home agent says it has been recently ruled that terms like "full shrink" and "pre-shrunk" shall not be used in describing or labeling any cotton material unless the fabric will not shrink at all when laundered. If the fabric will shrink further, she says, the label must tell how much.

Terms like "pre-shrunk" may be used only if they are qualified by an additional statement, such as "will not shrink more than . . . per cent." Miss Spars explains that a label says "full shrink" without reference to any part of the shirt, the term should refer to the entire garment, she says, and if the label says "collar linings pre-shrunk," the body of the shirt has not necessarily been subjected to a shrinkage treatment and it may shrink badly.

Simple Wedding Breakfast

Scrambled eggs  
Hot rolls

3 ripe pears  
1 small lemon  
3 peaches  
1 pint lemon ice  
Pare and dice fruit and place in sherbert glasses; top with lemon ice. Fill glasses from 30 to 40 minutes. Serve immediately. Six servings.

**Wedding Cake**

5 cups sifted cake flour  
2 cups sugar  
1-2 teaspoon baking powder  
1-2 teaspoon salt  
1 cup shortening  
3 eggs sugar  
3-4 tablespoon vanilla  
2 cups milk  
10 egg whites

Mix and flour, baking powder and salt. Cream shortening until smooth, gradually add sugar, creaming until very fluffy; add vanilla. Add flour alternately with milk, beating until smooth after each addition; fold in thoroughly the stiffly beaten egg whites. Turn in three greased layer pans of different sizes, fill each about half full and bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) from 30 to 40 minutes. When cool put layers together, pyramid style, with boiled frosting, spreading very smoothly. Decorate with white rose buds using pastry tube. Stand tiny bride and groom in center.

**Boiled Frosting**

1-2 cups sugar  
1 tablespoon light corn syrup  
1-2 cup water  
2 egg whites  
Dash of salt  
1 teaspoon vanilla

Put sugar, water and corn syrup in sauce pan and stir over low heat until sugar is dissolved; boil covered, about 3 minutes; then boil uncovered and without stirring, until a small amount of syrup forms a soft ball when dropped in cold water. Remove syrup from heat, quickly add egg whites until stiff, then pour syrup in fine stream over egg whites, beating constantly; add salt and flavoring, continue beating until frosting is cool and of proper consistency to spread. Stir in very lightly one-fourth cup confectioners' sugar (350 degrees) from 30 to 40 minutes. This should be stiff enough to hold its shape when molded as flowers or other decorations. Apply with pastry tube. Approximate yield: Two cups frosting.

Open Letter Pleads With People to Cooperate with U.S.

Dear Friends: My sincere desire to be of service to you and the high regard I have for you motivates this letter.

(1) According to the radio address of the president of the United States, our country has passed from a status of neutrality to that of non-belligerency. This means that we are not proposing to be of all the assistance possible to the Allies short of an actual declaration of war.

(2) In view of the seriousness of the situation, I beg to advise that we divest ourselves of all war hysteria and view the conditions with brave hearts and calm spirits. We cannot plan to meet the issues we face without equanimity and determination.

(3) That we co-operate in every possible way with our government, both state and national; obey orders to the letter, and make any sacrifices necessary for the good of our country. That we do not run where we have not been sent, but wait for the orders of those in authority over us, and when the orders come obey with alacrity and resolution.

(4) That we remember that our God is the Lord God of Hosts. That we crowd His houses of prayer, listen to the word of exhortation from our ministers, and pray much both in public and private for Divine guidance.
