

Georgia Farmers Talk Fertilizer Prices

GOVERNMENT REPORTS FERTILIZER SUPPLIES A BUMPER YIELD

ASSURED DESPITE WAR

Lower crop acreages and higher of fertilizer materials suffered the beginning of the last Europ war, the present purchasing set for fertilizer finds the country From the fewest number of acres harvested under normal weather this year's crops.

"At the beginning of the last World War an immediate deficiency of nitrogen carriers occurred," said Charles J. Brand, Executive Secretary and Treasurer of The National Fertilizer Association. "There was an almost total absocret "There was an almost total absence of potash. Although there was plenty of phosphate rock, there was a shortage of sulphuric acid needed to make superphosphate.

"When war disrupted shipping from 1914 to 1918, nitrogen mate-rials for fertilizer became scarce, as we were once bound to Chile for nitrates," said Mr. Brand. "Today, we not only have adequa hipping service from Chile, but our country is the third largest pro-ducer of synthetic nitrogen in the world, and the largest producer of ammonium sulphate.
