COOL DRINKS FOR HOT DAYS

Sugar Syrup
Boil equal amounts of sugar and water about ten minutes; pour into a sterilized jar, cover, and use for beverages.

Lemonade
6 lemons (1 cup up and 2 table-spoons juice)
1 cup sugar
3 1/2 cups water
Squeeze juice from lemons; add to syrup and dilute with water, adding more syrup if a sweeter drink is desired; pour over cracked ice in tall glasses and garnish with mint leaves, orange slices, fresh berries or pineapple sticks.

Cranberry Punch
1 1/2 cups sugar
3 cups boiling water
2 cups cranberry sauce
1-3 cup lemon juice
1 pint raspberry ice
1 quart carbonated water
1 cup marshmallow cherries
Beat cranberry jelly with rotary beater until frothy; add hot water and continue beating until jelly is dissolved; add fruit juices and chill before serving; add ginger ale and pour over large piece of ice. Yield: 3 quarts, or 24 small glasses.

Rhubarb Flip
Stir 1 cup sweetened rhubarb juice, 1 tablespoon sugar, and a dash of nutmeg into 3 well-beaten egg yolks and pour over cracked ice in 6 tall glasses. Fill with ginger ale and serve at once.

Ginger Ale Punch
1 quart grape juice
1-2 cup sugar syrup
1 quart strong tea
1-2 cup lemon juice
1-2 cup grape juice, tea, ginger ale, lemon juice and sugar syrup. Pour over cracked ice and serve. Approximate yield: 24 punch cup portions.

Fruit Juice Punch
2 quarts strong tea
1 1/2 to 2 quarts loganberry juice
1-2-3 cups strained lemon juice (4 bottles 19 oz.)
1 cup sugar
Mix tea, fruit juice, water and sugar, and chill half a day. Just before serving, add ginger ale and pour over large piece of ice in quart or 60 small glasses.

Tea and Orange Punch
To 2 cups tea infusion, add 2 cups orange juice, 1-2 cup each lemon juice, grapefruit juice and fruit, 1 1/2 cups sugar syrup and 2 quarts water. Pour over block of ice and serve garnished with thin slices of orange.

Apple and Orange Punch
2 cups currant jelly
2 cups boiling water
2 cups pineapple juice
1 cup orange juice
2 cups strained lime juice
1 quart ginger ale
Beat currant jelly with rotary beater until frothy; add hot water and continue beating until jelly is dissolved; add fruit juices and chill before serving; add ginger ale and pour over large piece of ice. Yield: 3 quarts, or 24 small glasses.

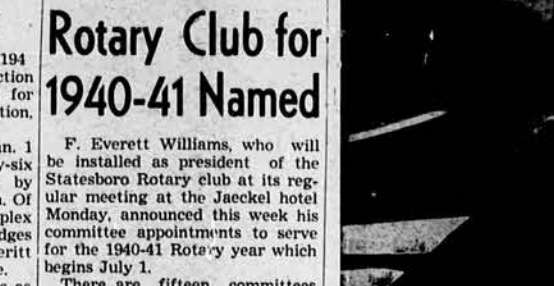
