# Local Airmen Use Coffin Box For Telephone Booth

As a constant warning that "dead men tell no tales" a shipping crate for dead bodies is being used for a telephone

Recently the Statesboro Aircraft corporation installed a telephone in the airport han-gar. Feeling the need for a certain degree of privacy, E. L. Barnes, local undertaker and air enthuslast, furnished the corporation with a ship-ping box in which he had re-cently received a dead body from another state for burial

The box was moved into the hangar and merely stood up on one end against the wall of the hangar. The phone was installed on what was the bottom of the crate. The lid of the box serves as a door and the entire arrangement provides a perfect telephone booth, the user of the phone absolute privacy.

This plan, assuring a regular price level throughout the tobacco marketing season will be of untold benefit to the tobacco farmers, pointed out the three local warehousemen. To take full advantage of it they suggest that the growers market their crop this season in a slower and more orderly manner which will do away with the glutting and blocking of all markets in the first ten days or two weeks of sales.

They pointed out that it has

They pointed out that it has been known that farmers have had to leave their weed on the warehouse floor for as long as a week before getting a sale, thus losing because of resulting deteriation and damage to his tobacco.

Mr. Cobb, Mr. Foxhall and Mr. Shennard all agrees that the propositions of the same properties of the same properties.

Mr. Cobb, Mr. Foxhall and Mr. Sheppard all agree that the proper procedure for marketing the crop is to sell the crop as it is cured; that is, begin at the first of the season with your first and second curings and work through to the middle leaf and tips. The tobacco buying companies expect this method of marketing and the sales made this way are always more satisfactory.

High-Quality Cotton
Properly ginned cotton is the order of the day. Farmers and ginners are urged to turn out quality line and thereby increase the income value of cotton.

In this connection, J. A. Miller, president of the Cotton Manufacturers' association, said this week that Georgia cotton mills, in order to supply buyer demands, will this season refuse to buy or will penalize in price materially any cotton which is not properly ginned.

"During recent years, requirements of mills for cotton have become more exacting each season, because the people who have purchased goods from the mills have constantly raised standards required for practically every kind of cotton goods produced, "the cotton association official pointed out. "This means that mills must be more exacting in purchasing their cotton each year, in order to meet these requiremnts."

Mr. Miller said inability to obtain cotton which has been ginned properly and which is smooth in preparation has made it difficult for mills to meet buyer requirements. Good quality cotton as senormous waste and many defects are present in goods manufactured from such cotton."
