

# MORE ABOUT HAMS

LAST WEEK WE described a "river of gold" as discovered by the growers of hogs in Bibb and surrounding counties under the inspiration of W. T. Anderson, of the Macon Telegraph, and the Georgia

A number of people have asked us what method the organization uses in curing the hams they sell as "Banner Hams." We did not have a description of the method they used but in last week's issue of the North Georgia Tribune, at Canton, Tom Arnold scribes the curing process, using information sent

We are very glad to give the method used in curing these hams. However, it is not so much the racipe used as it is the proper method of handling the details in selecting, trimming, curing, smoking and aging.

The Georgia Banner Hams Association does not use a special recipe but follows very closely the method outlined in the United States Department of Agriculture Farmers' Bulletin No. 1185, written by K. F. Warner. We advise getting this bulletin as it gives the method of curing hams, also including the curing, killing and canning of pork products in detail.

"Meat is a valuable and perishable product and unless it is handled properly the waste from the spoiled and unpalatable parts more than offsets he possible advantages from farm curing."

Most consumers desire uniform trim and flavor and to satisfy the requirement and make a permanent and exact product, the ham must be cut and handled with the greatest of care.

The Ham: Georgia Banner Hams are carefully selected from No. 1 hogs, that have been proper ly fed, properly butchered and properly cleaned. These hams, after being selected, are properly trimmed to avoid any unnecessary waste.

Chilling: Georgia Banner Hams are chilled to approximately 38 degrees within twenty-four hours after hogs have been slaughtered, getting the chilling started as quickly as possible after the

Curing Mixture: The curing mixture is the same as is suggested in Farmers' Bulletin No. 1186 page 22, under Dry Method as follows:

"Meat is likely to spoil, regardless of the quantity of salt applied, if the freshly slaughtered carcass and the curing meat are held at too high a temperature (Georgia degrees)

"The following curing mixture is recommended for 100 pounds of trimmed pork or hams:

"Smoked cured meat will have a brighter color and a milder flavor if it is freshened in cold water before smoked. Hams and shoulders are soaked about two hours in cold water before being smoked and bacon about thirty minutes. Most farmers do not soak hams and shoulders that are to be stored for summer use.

"It is usually best to hang the cured, washed meat in the smokehouse overnight to drain and dry. Start the fire in the morning. If the meat is still dripping when smoking begins, the lower pieces will be streaked. Hang the meat so that no wo pieces will touch." (Watch out for skipper

"Cured pork may be smoked at a temperature of 100 degrees to 120 degrees F. The ventilators should be left open, especially at first, to permit the moisture to escape. A heavy fog of smoke is unnecessary. Continue the smoking until the meat has the desired color. Two days should be enough

See Bulletin No. 1186 for details.




