The county cases in Bulloch county are cared for by the chairman of the county commissioners. At present there are twenty-eight cases on the county roll between the ages of 16 and 65. last year two cases were added to the county roll by the State Hospital at Milledgeville, not being able to care for all their patients, so sent back to the counties those that they considered harmless. These two did not have relatives who were willing to take the responsibility of their care so they were placed in the Bethany home. Vidalia, at a cost to the county of \$35.50 a month for their board. Both of these cases have now been taken on the old-age assistance roll and are costing the county.



Dairies Delivering Milk to City

WHEREAS: It is well recognized that the newspapers of the United States and of Georgia are fundamental to the spirit and the essence of Democracy; and, WHEREAS: The service which newspapers render to their comgrades of milk being sold in States boro is in accordance with the the general public; and,
WHEREAS: The people are too often inclined to take newspapers and their benefits for granted, without proper appreciation;
THEREFORE: I, E. D. Rivers, Governor of the State of Georgia, do hereby set aside the period from Oct. 1 to Oct. 8, 1940, and

United States Public Health Service Standard Milk Ordinance which was adopted by the city which was adopted by the city council of Statesboro in June, 1939. In short, the ordinance is stated as 'An ordinance to regulate the production, transportation, processing, handling, sampling, examination, grading, labeling, re-grading and sale of milk and milk products, the inspection of dairy herds, dairies and milk plants; the issuing and revocation of permits to milk producers and distributors, the placarding of restaurants and other establishments serving milk or milk produced.

The dairies listed below have complied with the requirements of the standard milk ordinance as determined by the Bulloch County Health Department in accordance

The Bulloch County Health Depurchase milk on the basis of grade. Each bottle of milk has the name of the dairy and the grade of milk marked plainly on the cap. Everyone is familiar with the fact that milk is our most important food. Milk is the only single substance whose sole function in nature is to serve as a complete food. Since milk is such a precious article of food and so susceptible to infection, it deserves to be handled with respect. The only method by which the general public may know that the milk they buy is handled with respect is by the label on the cap. A cap marked Grade A Pasteurized Milk is the safest pasteurized grade, and a cap marked Grade A Raw Milk is the safest pasteurized grade. The Bulloch County Health Department warns the consumers against buying milk that is not graded. There are fifteen more or less diseases that may be transmitted by milk, and ungraded or non-labeled milk may contain one or more of these disease germs.

THE WHITE HOUSE

BY THE GOVERNOR:

My Dear Mr. Hardy:

I hope in observance of National Newspaper Service Salute that due emphasis will be placed on the necessity for maintaining freedom of the press in a democracy. Freedom of conscience, of education, of speech, of assembly are among the very fundamentals of democracy and all of them would be nullified should freedom of the press ever be successfully challenged.

I have little fear that freedom of the press will be abridged from external assault in this country. The danger is from internal corruption. If our press exemplifies a passion for truth and justice and fair play to all, it will avoid that spiritual paralysis and decay which are the decily enemies of our free institutions.

I trust, as a result of the forthcoming celebration, that our newspapers everywhere—great and small—will rise anew to the tremeendous responsibilities which are theirs.
