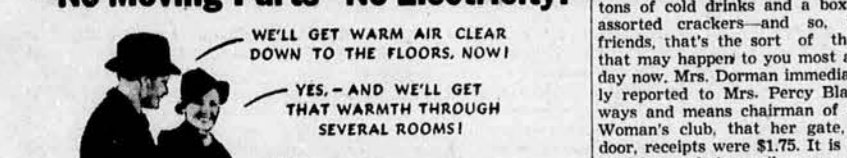

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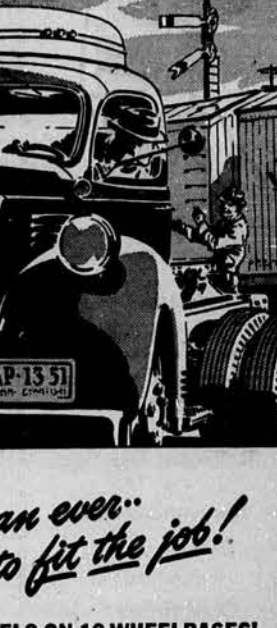

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F. I. Williams Heads Roosevelt-Wallace Club In Bulloch

According to an announcement this week, Frank I. Williams has been named temporary chairman of the Roosevelt-Wallace club in Bulloch county.

In his letter to Mr. Williams, temporary chairman, Mr. Arnall said, "It would be nothing short of a calamity for the American people to turf our government over to untrained and unskilled hands at this most perilous time, in the 164 years of our nation's history."
