

Acres In Camp Area Concern is being expressed over the re-allocation

of tobacco acreage which has been removed from production by government purchase of approximately 365,000 acres of land now being used as an anti-aircraft base at and around Hinesville. According to the Valdosta Times, Congressman

John S. Gibson of the Eighth Georgia district has advised that the allotments are to be re-allocated to other tobacco growers in South Georgia. Feeling that it would be entirely unfair to tobacco growers to remove this large acreage from production without some provision to allot the acreage to other growers, Mr. Gibson took the matter up with the proper officials and he is gratified that they have agreed with his position

There are no figures available as to how much intered as second-class matter, July 16, 1937, acreage Camp Stewart will remove from production but some say that it is enough to cause a serious loss to tobacco growers in the state.

Tobacco acreage is allocated to the various states in the tobacco belt and then the acreage assigned to each state is broken down and growers are given fixed allocation. If some plan is not devised by which the allotments in the anti-air craft base is located can be re-allocated, then Georgia growers will be subjected to a serious loss. Mr. Gibson is to be commended for his promptness in urging that the acreage in question be reassigned to other growers. According to The Savannah Morning News there has been no announced procedure to be followed in making the change but points out that the administrative offices of the tobacco control program in Georgia has been instructed to proceed with the re-allocation
